An individual shall be allowed to speak only once during the public comment portion of a meeting agenda or a public hearing. Speakers shall be limited to a presentation of three minutes. *

PUBLIC COMMENT

He was also concerned about the cost of the county and state assisting the police department during these events.

Bill Harrison did not like the new format of the agenda. He stated he was misquoted in public comment for the budget meeting and he asked for a correction. He was against cannabis use at Arts, Beats, and Eats and Taco Fest and objected to the Pride Event being in the park instead of on Washington.

Janice Wagman also did not like the new agenda format and it is not user friendly. She thanked Commissioners Cheezum and Herzog for turning in their ethics forms, as well as Commissioners Douglas, Macey and Hunt.

Phyllis Salter, North Lafayette, spoke about free speech, public forums and the three-minute time limit at public comment.

RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF TURTLE WOODS NATURE PRESERVE GRANT APPLICATION BY OAKLAND COUNTY

WHEREAS, the City of Royal Oak recognizes the importance of natural areas for the health, well-being, and enjoyment of its residents and the community at large; and

WHEREAS, Turtle Woods Nature Preserve represents a significant opportunity to protect and enhance biodiversity, support endangered species such as the spotted turtle, and provide educational and recreational opportunities for the public; and

WHEREAS, the preservation of Turtle Woods as an Oakland County Nature Preserve aligns with the City of Royal Oak's commitment to environmental stewardship, sustainability, and the enhancement of quality of life for its residents; and

WHEREAS, Oakland County Parks has developed a comprehensive plan to acquire and manage the Turtle Woods property as a county 70-acre nature preserve located in Troy (located north of Square Lake Road between John R Road and Dequindre Road), ensuring its protection and accessibility for future generations; and

WHEREAS, the support of local municipalities is crucial for the success of such grant applications, which seek to secure funding for the acquisition, management, and enhancement of natural areas within Oakland County; and

WHEREAS, the City of Royal Oak has previously demonstrated its support for the efforts of Oakland County Parks through resolutions and collaborative initiatives aimed at expanding and enhancing the county's park system for the benefit of all residents;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Commission of Royal Oak hereby expresses its strong support for the grant application submitted by Oakland County Parks for the acquisition and development of Turtle Woods as an Oakland County Nature Preserve; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Commission of Royal Oak encourages the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund, and all relevant bodies and agencies, to favorably consider and approve the grant application for Turtle Woods, recognizing the significant environmental, educational, and recreational benefits this project will bring to the residents of Royal Oak, Oakland County, and the State of Michigan.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Oakland County Parks, the Michigan Natural Resources Trust Fund, and other relevant parties as an expression of the City of Royal Oak's support for the Turtle Woods Nature Preserve grant application.

AMENDMENT TO THE CODE OF ORDINANCES

An Ordinance to amend the 2008 Ordinance Adopting the Royal Oak Code of Ordinances, codifying and adopting a new Code of the City of Royal Oak by adding a new Article XVIII, Sections 82-109 through 82-113, of Chapter 82, Historic Preservation, of the Code of Ordinances, City of Royal Oak, Michigan, to designate the open space and four (4) bridges located in the Vinsetta boulevard median from the Lawndale turnaround to the turnaround just before 12 Mile Road, as a historic district pursuant to the City of Royal Oak, Code of Ordinances and State law for the designation of historic properties in the City of Royal Oak.

THE CITY OF ROYAL OAK ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. Amendment.

That new Article XVIII and new Sections 82-109 through 82-113, of Chapter 82, Historic Preservation, of the Code of Ordinances, City of Royal Oak, Michigan, are hereby added, to read as follows:

**ARTICLE XVIII
Vinsetta Bridges Historic District**

§ 82-109. Title.

This article shall be known and may be cited as the "Royal Oak Vinsetta Bridges Historic District Ordinance."

§ 82-110. Purpose.

The purpose of this article is to provide for the preservation and/or rehabilitation of the Vinsetta Bridges Historic District comprised of property that runs along the Vinsetta boulevard median from the Lawndale turnaround to the turnaround just before 12 Mile Road, including four bridges, the open space between them, and bookmarked by the turnarounds on Vinsetta Boulevard, in the City of Royal Oak, Michigan, containing 126,275 square feet or 2.90 acres, more specifically described as:

A Parcel Of Land Being A Part Of Vinsetta Boulevard (150' Wide) Of Vinsetta Park Subdivision As Recorded In Uber 12 Of Plats, On Page 30, Oakland County Records Being Part Of Section 16, Town 1 North, Range 11 East, Royal Oak Township (Now City), Oakland County, Michigan And Being More Particularly Described As Follows: Commencing At The Northerly Corner Of Lot 142 Of Said Vinsetta Park Subdivision; Thence South 32 Degrees 53 Minutes 00 Seconds West, 146.20 Feet Along The Westerly Line Of Said Lot 142 To The Westerly Corner Of Said Lot 142; Thence North 61 Degrees 18 Minutes 12 Seconds West, 45.48 Feet To The Point Of Beginning; Thence 22.14 Feet Along The Arc Of A Curve To The Right, Having A Radius Of 13.84 Feet, A Central Angle Of 91 Degrees 36 Minutes 51 Seconds, And A Chord Bearing And Distance Of South 76 Degrees 32 Minutes 40 Seconds West, 19.85 Feet; Thence North 66 Degrees 12 Minutes 38 Seconds West, 19.45 Feet; Thence 29.87 Feet Along The Arc Of A Curve To The Right, Having A Radius Of 15.43 Feet, A Central Angle Of 110 Degrees 54 Minutes 35 Seconds, And A Chord Bearing And Distance Of North 22 Degrees 43 Minutes 03 Seconds West, 25.42

§ 82-111. Eligibility.

The Royal Oak City Commission determines that the property described above is eligible for local historic designation under the guidelines established by City of Royal Oak Code of Ordinances § 82-1, et seq., the Historic Preservation Ordinance.

§ 82-112. Designation.

The Royal Oak City Commission hereby designates the property described in § 82-110 as a historic district pursuant to City of Royal Oak Code of Ordinances § 82-1, et seq., the Historic Preservation Ordinance.

§ 82-113. Certificate of appropriateness.

The owners of the properties or portions of the properties described in § 82-110 are required to apply for and obtain a certificate of appropriateness before commencing any work in the historic site. Provided however, that all public and/or semi-public bodies with public utilities within the Vinsetta Boulevard right-of-way are exempted from the need to seek a certificate of appropriateness from the Royal Oak Historic District Commission for any maintenance, repair, replacement, or other work on such utilities, or for routine maintenance of trees and other plant material. When considering an application, the Historic District Commission will be guided by the standards for rehabilitation set forth by the United States Secretary of the Interior at 26 CFR Part 67 and the City of Royal Oak Code of Ordinances § 82-13, et seq.

SECTION 2. Repealer.

All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, in conflict with this ordinance are repealed only to the extent necessary to give this ordinance full force and effect.

SECTION 3. Severability.

Should any section, subsection, clause, or phrase of this ordinance be declared by the courts to be invalid, the validity of the ordinance as a whole, or in part, shall not be affected other than the part invalidated.

SECTION 4. Savings.

All proceedings pending and all rights and liabilities existing, acquired or incurred at the time this ordinance takes effect, are saved and may be consummated according to the law in force when they were commenced.

SECTION 5. Effective Date.

This ordinance as ordered shall take effect ten (10) days after its adoption and upon publication.

SECTION 6. Inspection.

A copy of this ordinance may be inspected or purchased at the city clerk's office between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. on regular business days and between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 12:00 p.m. on Fridays.

This Agreement is made between Oakland County, a Constitutional Corporation, 1200 North Telegraph, Pontiac, Michigan 48341 ("County") and City of Royal Oak, 211 Williams St., Royal Oak, MI 48324, a Michigan Municipal Corporation ("Municipality"). The County and Municipality shall be collectively referred to as the "Parties."

PURPOSE OF AGREEMENT.

The Parties enter into this Agreement for the purpose of delineating their relationship and responsibilities regarding the County's use of Grant funds (defined below) to reimburse the Municipality for overtime expenses that it incurred related to its participation in the Oakland County Narcotic Enforcement Team ("N.E.T."), a multijurisdictional drug enforcement task force under the direction and supervision of the Oakland County Sheriff's Office ("OCSO").

Under the Parties' separate N.E.T. agreement, the Municipality is responsible for providing a full-time employee for participation in N.E.T. and for all costs associated with that employment, including overtime.

The County, as the legal entity that administers N.E.T., submitted an Initiative Description and Budget Proposal (Exhibit A) to the Executive Board for Michigan HIDTA requesting the United States Office of National Drug Control Policy ("ONDCP") to grant N.E.T. an award for program year (PY) 2024 to reimburse N.E.T. participating agencies for eligible law enforcement officer overtime. PY 2024 begins January 1, 2024, and ends December 31, 2024.

If ONDCP grants N.E.T. an award for PY 2024, the ONDCP disburses the HIDTA grant funds to the City of Novi. To receive the Grant funds for overtime costs, N.E.T. must submit requests for reimbursement with the required supporting documentation to Michigan HIDTA. If Michigan HIDTA approves the N.E.T. overtime reimbursement requests, the City of Novi should distribute the Grant funds to County on behalf of N.E.T. The County has the authority to allocate a portion of the Grant funds to reimburse the Municipality for qualifying overtime costs subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.

In consideration of the mutual promises, obligations, representations, and assurances in this Agreement, the Parties agree to the following:

- 1. DEFINITIONS.** The following terms, whether used in the singular or plural, within or without quotation marks, or possessive or nonpossessive, shall be defined, read, and interpreted as follows:

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- 1.1. **Claim** means any alleged loss, claim, complaint, demand for relief or damages, cause of action, proceeding, judgment, deficiency, liability, penalty, fine, litigation, costs, and/or expenses, including, but not limited to, reimbursement for attorney fees, witness fees, court costs, investigation expenses, litigation expenses, and amounts paid in settlement, which are imposed on, incurred by, or asserted against the County or Municipality, or the County's or Municipality's agents or employees, whether such claim is brought in law or equity, tort, contract, or otherwise.
- 1.2. **Grant funds** mean the funds that may be awarded to the County and the other participating agencies in N.E.T. pursuant to Michigan HIDTA Initiative Description and Budget Proposal Version 2024 (Exhibit A) submitted to Michigan HIDTA by County on behalf of itself and the other participating agencies in N.E.T.

HIDTA Objective: To reduce drug trafficking and drug production in the United States by: (A) facilitating cooperation among Federal, State, local, and tribal law enforcement agencies to share information and implement coordinated enforcement activities; (B) enhancing law enforcement intelligence sharing among Federal, State, local, and tribal law enforcement agencies; (C) providing reliable law enforcement intelligence to law enforcement agencies needed to design effective enforcement strategies and operations; and (D) supporting coordinated law enforcement strategies which maximize use of available resources to reduce the supply of illegal drugs in designated areas and in the United States as a whole.
- 3.4. Period of Performance: January 1, 2024, through December 31, 2024.

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3.5. The Federal Award Identification Number (FAIN) is provided in the HIDTA Grant Agreement between ONDCP and the City of Novi, which is incorporated into this Agreement by reference.

4. USE OF HIDTA FUNDS.

4.1. The total amount of the federal award for overtime costs committed to the Municipality and obligated by this action by the County to the Municipality is not to exceed **\$6,000.00** for each participating law enforcement officer unless otherwise provided herein. That amount is based on the number of N.E.T participating agencies and eligible law enforcement officers at the time this Agreement was executed by both Parties. If the number of N.E.T participating agencies and/or eligible law enforcement officers changes during the term of this Agreement, the total amount of the federal award for overtime costs committed to the Municipality and obligated by this action by the County to the Municipality amount may change as funds are available on a pro rata basis. Such commitment and obligation for overtime costs is contingent upon the ONDCP awarding the Grant funds to N.E.T and the City of Novi reimbursing the County.

4.2. The County will reimburse the Municipality up to **\$6,000.00** for each participating law enforcement officer for qualifying N.E.T.-related overtime unless otherwise provided herein. That amount is based on the number of N.E.T participating agencies and eligible law enforcement officers at the time this Agreement was executed by both Parties. If the number of N.E.T participating agencies and/or eligible law enforcement officers changes during the term of this Agreement, the maximum reimbursement amount may change as funds are available on a pro rata basis. Such reimbursement shall only be made after the supporting documentation is submitted by the Municipality and approved by the County, as described in Paragraph 5.1. Such reimbursement is contingent upon the ONDCP awarding the grant funds to N.E.T and the City of Novi reimbursing the County.

4.2.1. HIDTA funds shall be used to pay overtime only if the overtime was performed in support of a HIDTA-designated Enforcement initiative or Intelligence and information Sharing Initiative. HIDTA funds shall not be used to pay overtime related to training attendance, financial management, drug treatment, drug demand reduction or prevention, or non-investigative related administrative work.

4.2.2. No HIDTA funds shall be used to supplant the Municipality's funds that would otherwise be made available for the same purposes.

4.3. There is no research and development performed pursuant to this Agreement.

4.4. No indirect costs shall be charged or reimbursed under performance of this Agreement.

5. REIMBURSEMENT OF ELIGIBLE N.E.T. OVERTIME.

5.1. To request reimbursement for eligible N.E.T. overtime costs, the Municipality shall submit to the County the documentation described in the following subparagraphs no later than thirty (30) days after PY 2024 has expired. If the County, in its sole discretion, determines that the

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documentation submitted by the Municipality does not reconcile, then the Municipality shall provide any additional documentation requested by the County in order to process payment.

- 5.1.1. A fully completed and signed Request for HIDTA Overtime Reimbursement attached as Exhibit B.
- 5.1.2. A letter substantively similar to the sample letter regarding notification of current overtime pay rate attached as Exhibit C.
- 5.1.3. Overtime slips, signed by the officer's supervisor, that support each Request for HIDTA Overtime Reimbursement. The overtime slips shall be substantively similar to the sample overtime slip attached as Exhibit D.
- 5.1.4. The paystub or payroll report that supports each Request for HIDTA Overtime Reimbursement. The paystub or payroll report shall be substantively similar to the sample paystub attached as Exhibit E.

5.2. County will only reimburse Municipality for approved overtime costs after County has received the Grant funds from the City of Novi for that particular reimbursement request.

6. GENERAL COMPLIANCE.

- 6.1. The Municipality shall comply with 28 C.F.R. Part 69 (New Restrictions on Lobbying) and 2 C.F.R. Part 25 (Universal Identifier and System of Award Management).
- 6.2. The Municipality shall comply with the Government-wide Suspension and Debarment provision set forth at 2 CFR Part 180.
- 6.3. The Municipality shall perform all activities in accordance with The Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements in 2 C.F.R. Part 200 (the "Part 200 Uniform Requirements"), as adopted and implemented by the Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) in 2 C.F.R. Part 3603. For this award, the Part 200 Uniform Requirements supersede, among other things, the provisions of 28 C.F.R. Parts 66 and 70, as well as those of 2 C.F.R. Parts 215, 220, 225, and 230.
- 6.4. The Municipality shall comply with ONDCP's HIDTA Program Policy and Budget Guidance, all other applicable Federal, state, and local laws and regulations, and the terms and conditions contained in this Agreement.
- 6.5. The Municipality shall comply with all applicable requirements for subrecipients that are provided in the HIDTA Grant Agreement between ONDCP and the City of Novi. The HIDTA Grant Agreement between ONDCP and the City of Novi will be provided to the Municipality within a reasonable time after the County receives a copy of it.
- 6.6. As specified in the HIDTA Program Policy and Budget Guidance, the Municipality must:

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- 6.6.1. Establish and maintain effective internal controls over the Federal award that provides reasonable assurance that Federal award funds are managed in compliance with Federal statutes, regulations and award terms and conditions. These internal controls should be in compliance with the guidance in “Standards for Internal Control in the Federal Government,” issued by the Comptroller General of the United States and the “Internal Control Integrated Framework,” issued by the Committee of Sponsoring Organizations of the Treadway Commission (COSO).
- 6.6.2. Comply with Federal statutes, regulations, and the terms and conditions of the Federal awards.
- 6.6.3. Evaluate and monitor compliance with applicable statute and regulations, and the terms and conditions of the Federal award.
- 6.6.4. Take prompt action when instances of noncompliance are identified, including noncompliance identified in audit findings.
- 6.6.5. Take reasonable measures to safeguard protected personally identified information (PII) and other information ONDCP or the Municipality designates consistent with applicable Federal, state, and local laws regarding privacy and obligations of confidentiality.

7. FINANCIAL ACCOUNTABILITY AND AUDIT REQUIREMENTS.

- 7.1. The Municipality shall maintain standards of financial accountability that conform to 2 C.F.R. §200.302 (Financial Management) and 2 C.F.R. §200.303 (Internal Controls).
- 7.2. The Municipality shall comply with audit requirements contained in 2 C.F.R. Part 200, Subpart F, which requires the Municipality to have an annual audit conducted within nine (9) months of the end of their fiscal year, if the Municipality has an aggregate expenditure of more than \$750,000 in federal funds in a fiscal year. Any deficiencies noted in audit reports must be fully cleared by the Municipality within thirty (30) days after receipt of same. The Grant funds spent by the County on behalf of the Municipality for training expenses shall be included on the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards if the Municipality is required to have a single audit performed. Municipalities that are exempt from the Single Audit requirements that receive less than \$750,000 of total Federal funding must submit a Financial Statement Audit prepared in accordance with Generally Accepted Auditing Standards (“GAAS”) if the audit includes disclosures that may negatively impact the HIDTA program including, but not limited to fraud, financial misstatements, and violations of any contract or grant provisions. The County shall have the right to review and audit all records of the Municipality pertaining to any payment by the County.

8. CONFLICT OF INTEREST.

- 8.1. The Municipality shall comply with the following ONDCP conflict of interest policies:

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- 8.1.1. As a non-Federal entity, you must maintain written standards of conduct covering conflicts of interest and governing the performance of your employees engaged in the selection, award, and administration of subawards and contracts.
- 8.1.2. None of your employees may participate in the selection, award, or administration of a subaward or contract supported by a Federal award if he or she has a real or apparent conflict of interest. Such a conflict of interest would arise when the employee, officer, or agent, any member of his or her immediate family, his or her partner, or an organization which employs or is about to employ any of the parties indicated herein, has a financial or other interest in or a tangible personal benefit from an organization considered for a subaward or contract. The officers, employees, and agents of the non-Federal entity must neither solicit nor accept gratuities, favors, or anything of monetary value from subrecipients or contractors or parties to subawards or contracts.
- 8.1.3. If you have a parent, affiliate, or subsidiary organization that is not a State, local government, or Indian tribe, you must also maintain written standards of conduct covering organizational conflicts of interest. Organizational conflicts of interest means that because of relationships with a parent company, affiliate, or subsidiary organization, you are unable or appear to be unable to be impartial in conducting a sub-award or procurement action involving a related organization.

9. MANDATORY DISCLOSURE.

- 9.1. As a non-Federal entity, the Municipality must disclose, in a timely manner, in writing to ONDCP all violations of Federal criminal law involving fraud, bribery or gratuity violations potentially affecting the Federal award. Non-Federal entities that have received a Federal award that includes the term and condition outlined in 200 CFR Part 200, Appendix XII "Award Term and Condition for Recipient Integrity and Performance Matters," are required to report certain civil, criminal, or administrative proceedings to System for Award Management (SAM). Failure to make required disclosures can result in remedies such as: temporary withholding of payments pending correction of the deficiency, disallowance of all or part of the costs associated with noncompliance, suspension, termination of award, debarment, or other legally available remedies outlined in 2 CFR 200.338 "Remedies for Noncompliance".

10. RECORD RETENTION.

- 10.1. The Municipality shall comply with the record retention provisions of 2 C.F.R. 200.333 (Retention requirements for records).
- 10.2. The Municipality should, whenever practicable, collect, transmit, and store Federal award-related information in open and machine readable formats rather than in closed formats or on paper in accordance with 2 C.F.R. 200.335 (Methods for collection, transmission and storage of information).

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11. ACCESS TO RECORDS.

- 11.1. The Federal awarding agency, Inspectors General, the Comptroller General of the United States, and the County, or any of their authorized representatives, have the right of access to any documents, papers, or other records of the Municipal entity which are pertinent to the Federal award, in order to make audits, examinations, excerpts, and transcripts. The right also includes timely and reasonable access to the Municipality's personnel for the purpose of interview and discussion related to such documents. The right of access to the Municipality's records is not limited to the required retention period but last as long as the records are retained.
- 11.2. The Municipality shall permit the County and auditors to have access to the Municipality's records and financial statements as necessary for the County to meet the requirements of 2 C.F.R. Part 200.

12. TERM.

- 12.1. This Agreement and any amendments hereto shall be effective when executed by both Parties with concurrent resolutions passed by the governing bodies of each Party, and when the Agreement is filed according to MCL 124.510. The approval and terms of this Agreement and any amendments hereto shall be entered in the official minutes of the governing bodies of each Party. This Agreement shall end on December 31, 2024.

13. ASSURANCES.

- 13.1. Each Party shall be responsible for its own acts and the acts of its employees and agents, the costs associated with those acts, and the defense of those acts.
- 13.2. The Parties have taken all actions and secured all approvals necessary to authorize and complete this Agreement. The persons signing this Agreement on behalf of each Party have legal authority to sign this Agreement and bind the Parties to the terms and conditions contained herein.
- 13.3. Each Party shall comply with all federal, state, and local ordinances, regulations, administrative rules, laws, and requirements applicable to its activities performed under this Agreement.

14. TERMINATION OF AGREEMENT.

- 14.1. This Agreement may be terminated in whole or in part as follows:
 - 14.1.1. by the County, if the Municipality fails to comply with the terms and conditions of this Agreement;
 - 14.1.2. by the County for cause;

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- 14.1.3. by the County with the consent of the Municipality, in which case the two parties must agree upon the termination conditions, including the effective date and, in the case of partial termination, the portion to be terminated;
- 14.1.4. by the Municipality upon sending to the County written notification setting forth the reasons for such termination, the effective date, and, in the case of partial termination, the portion to be terminated. However, if the County determines in the case of partial termination that the reduced or modified portion of the subaward will not accomplish the purpose for which this Agreement was made, the County may terminate the Agreement in its entirety.

- 14.2. The County must provide to the Municipality a notice of termination. Written suspension or notice of termination will be sent to the Municipality's business address. If this Agreement is terminated or partially terminated, both the County and the Municipality remain responsible for compliance with the requirements at 2 CFR 200.343 Closeout and 2 CFR 200.344 Post-closeout Adjustments and Continuing Responsibilities.

15. CLOSEOUT.

- 15.1. The County shall close-out this Agreement when it determines that all applicable administrative actions and all required work under this Agreement have been completed by Municipality.
- 15.2. The Municipality shall comply with the closeout provisions of 2 C.F.R. 200.343 (Closeout).

16. POST-CLOSEOUT ADJUSTMENTS AND CONTINUING RESPONSIBILITIES.

- 16.1. The closeout of this Agreement does not affect any of the following:
 - 16.1.1. The right of County to disallow costs and recover funds on the basis of a later audit or other review. The County must make any cost disallowance determination and notify the Municipality within the record retention period;
 - 16.1.2. The obligation of the Municipality to return any funds due as a result of later refunds, corrections, or other transactions including final indirect cost rate adjustments;
 - 16.1.3. Audit requirements in Subpart F—Audit Requirements of 2 C.F.R. Part 200.
 - 16.1.4. Records retention as required in Subpart D—Post Federal Award Requirements of this part, §200.333 Retention requirements for records through §200.337 Restrictions on public access to records.

17. REMEDIES FOR NONCOMPLIANCE.

- 17.1. If the Municipality fails to comply with federal statutes, regulations, or the terms and conditions of this Agreement, the County may impose additional conditions, as described in 2 CFR §200.207 Specific Conditions. If the County determines that noncompliance cannot be

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remedied by imposing additional conditions, the County may take one or more of the following actions, as appropriate in the circumstances:

- 17.1.1. temporarily withhold cash payments pending correction of the deficiency by the Municipality or more severe enforcement action by the County;
- 17.1.2. disallow (that is, deny both use of funds and any applicable matching credit for) all or part of the cost of the activity or action not in compliance;
- 17.1.3. wholly or partly suspend or terminate the Agreement;
- 17.1.4. recommend that the Federal awarding agency initiate suspension or debarment proceedings as authorized under 2 CFR Part 180 and Federal awarding agency regulations;
- 17.1.5. withhold further funds for the project or program;
- 17.1.6. take other remedies that may be legally available.

18. NO THIRD-PARTY BENEFICIARIES. Except as provided for the benefit of the Parties, this Agreement does not and is not intended to create any obligation, duty, promise, contractual right or benefit, right to indemnification, right to subrogation, and/or any other right, in favor of any other person or entity.

19. DISCRIMINATION. The Parties shall not discriminate against their employees, agents, applicants for employment, or other persons or entities with respect to hire, tenure, terms, conditions, and privileges of employment, or any matter directly or indirectly related to employment in violation of any federal, state or local law.

20. PERMITS AND LICENSES. Each Party shall be responsible for obtaining and maintaining, throughout the term of this Agreement, all licenses, permits, certificates, and governmental authorizations necessary to carry out its obligations and duties pursuant to this Agreement.

21. RESERVATION OF RIGHTS. This Agreement does not, and is not intended to waive, impair, divest, delegate, or contravene any constitutional, statutory, and/or other legal right, privilege, power, obligation, duty, or immunity of the Parties.

22. DELEGATION/SUBCONTRACT/ASSIGNMENT. Neither Party shall delegate, subcontract, and/or assign any obligations or rights under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other Party.

23. NO IMPLIED WAIVER. Absent a written waiver, no act, failure, or delay by a Party to pursue or enforce any rights or remedies under this Agreement shall constitute a waiver of those rights with regard to any existing or subsequent breach of this Agreement. No waiver of any term, condition, or provision of this Agreement, whether by conduct or otherwise, in one or more instances, shall be deemed or construed as a continuing waiver of any term, condition, or provision of this Agreement.

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No waiver by either Party shall subsequently affect its right to require strict performance of this Agreement.

24. SEVERABILITY. If a court of competent jurisdiction finds a term, or condition, of this Agreement to be illegal or invalid, then the term, or condition, shall be deemed severed from this Agreement. All other terms, conditions, and provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force.

25. CAPTIONS. The section and subsection numbers and captions in this Agreement are intended for the convenience of the reader and are not intended to have any substantive meaning. The numbers and captions shall not be interpreted or be considered as part of this Agreement. Any use of the singular or plural number, any reference to the male, female, or neuter genders, and any possessive or nonpossessive use in this Agreement shall be deemed the appropriate plurality, gender or possession as the context requires.

26. NOTICES. Notices given under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be personally delivered, sent by express delivery service, certified mail, or first-class U.S. mail postage prepaid, and addressed to the person listed below. Notice will be deemed given on the date when one of the following first occur: (1) the date of actual receipt; (2) the next business day when notice is sent express delivery service or personal delivery; or (3) three days after mailing first class or certified U.S. mail.

26.1. If Notice is sent to the County, it shall be addressed and sent to: Oakland County Board of Commissioners Chairperson, 1200 North Telegraph, Pontiac, Michigan 48341, with a copy to Oakland County Sheriff's Office, Sheriff Fiscal Officer, 1200 N. Telegraph, Bldg. 38E, Pontiac, Michigan 48341.

26.2. If Notice is sent to the Political Subdivision, it shall be addressed to: City of Royal Oak.

26.3. Either Party may change the address and/or individual to which Notice is sent by notifying the other Party in writing of the change.

30. ENTIRE AGREEMENT. This Agreement represents the entire agreement and understanding between the Parties. This Agreement supersedes all other oral or written agreements between the Parties. The language of this Agreement shall be construed as a whole according to its fair meaning, and not construed strictly for or against any Party.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The city retains a consulting firm each year for material testing and quality control services on city construction projects. Services include testing for concrete, asphalt, soils, density and laboratory testing.

The city prepared a Request for Proposals dated February 1, 2024 to provide professional engineering services for this work, and performed a quality-based selection (QBS) process to select the consultant. The city received four proposals, which were independently ranked by several reviewers based on understanding of the requirements, experience and references, personnel qualifications, firm location and availability, and unit pricing. A summary of the ranking is provided in attached Table 1.

Based on this information, the engineering division recommends awarding the work to Intertek Professional Services Industries, Inc. (PSI) of Macomb, Michigan for the unit prices provided in Table 2. If the city wishes to continue using PSI's services after the first year (May 1, 2024 through April 30, 2025), a percentage increase in unit prices has been provided as outlined in Table 2.

The funding source for this work is primarily local road fund, major road fund, and water and sewer fund, and the budget for the work is included in each of the city's construction projects.

Most of the city's construction projects require materials testing to ensure the contractors' work products meet the required specifications. This cost varies depending on the type of project, but is generally around one percent of the total project cost. This cost is included and considered when staff recommends award of a particular project to ensure the funding is available.

AGREEMENT FOR
CONSULTING ENGINEERING SERVICES**

Pursuant to City Commission Resolution from the March 11, 2024 commission meeting, the City of Royal Oak (City) and Professional Service Industries, Inc. (consultant) whose principal offices are located at 16049 Leone Drive, Macomb, Michigan 48042 based on the consultant's Proposal for 2024 Material Testing and Quality Control Services Contract QCS2401 received on February 27, 2024 (copy attached), agree as follows:

- A. The consultant shall perform the tasks as stated in the attached Proposal, which is incorporated as part of this agreement. The city shall pay the consultant for specific work performed for the fees stated in the Proposal.
- B. This Agreement shall be effective as of the date of this Contract and remain in effect until the project is complete or the agreement is terminated in accordance with Paragraph F.
- C. All files, records, documents, reports, materials, and computer-generated word processing data resulting from the services to be performed under this Agreement shall at all times be considered the property of the city. No changes or modifications shall be made to plans or other documents without the express written consent and approval of the consultant. It is agreed and understood that should the city choose to use the documents for any purpose other than the construction of the elements detailed and described within the Contract Documents for the project, the city shall hold harmless and indemnify the consultant from any claim arising out of their use.
- D. The consultant shall not assign or transfer this Agreement to any other individual, partnership, corporation, joint venture, or other entity without the written consent of the city.
- E. The consultant shall conform to all applicable laws, ordinances, city standards and statutes of the Federal Government, State of Michigan and City of Royal Oak, including but not limited to, the following:
 - Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended
 - Davis Bacon Act, as amended (40 USC 327-330)
 - Copeland "Anti-Kickback" Act (18 USC 874), as supplemented in the Department of Labor Regulations (20 CFR - Part 3)
 - 2003 Rules and Regulations (24 CFR - Part 85.220)
- F. The city reserves the right to terminate the contract at any time with the assurance that the consultant shall be entitled to reimbursement for any services rendered prior to the date of termination.
- G. Provide a statement that the consultant will not perform any services for the city in which there is a conflict of interest, or the appearance of a conflict of interest, with any builder, developer, contractor or private client who is active in the city.

If the consultant is currently performing services for a builder, developer, contractor or private client who is or might be expected to be active in the city, the consulting engineer shall provide a detailed listing of this work, as well as the anticipated date of completion.

- H. The consultant will be held responsible for additional costs to the city resulting from negligence, mismanagement, delays or improper guidance. When it can be established that the consultant is clearly at fault, these additional costs will be borne by the consultant.
- I. The consultant shall not commence work under this agreement until it has obtained the following required insurance. All coverage shall be with insurance carriers acceptable to the city. All insurance carriers shall be licensed and admitted to do business in the State of Michigan. The consultant shall require each of its sub-consultants, if any, to maintain the following required insurance. If any insurance is written with a deductible or self-insured retention, the consultant shall be solely responsible for said deductible or self-insured retention. The purchase of insurance and the furnishing of a certificate of insurance shall not constitute satisfaction of the consultant's indemnification of the city.

The consultant and its subcontractors, if any, shall procure and maintain during the life of the agreement the following coverage and produce valid certificates of insurance and required endorsements:

- 1. Workers compensation insurance in accordance with all applicable statutes of the State of Michigan. Coverage shall include a minimum \$250,000 employers liability coverage.
- 2. Commercial general liability insurance on an "occurrence" basis with limits of liability not less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence aggregate. Coverage shall include the following extensions:
 - a. Per Contract Aggregate (Annual Aggregate Contract Limit)
 - b. Contractual liability
 - c. Products and completed operations
 - d. Independent contractors coverage
 - e. Broad form general liability extensions or equivalent
 - f. Explosion, Collapse, and Underground, if applicable
- 3. Automobile liability insurance, including Michigan no-fault coverage, for all vehicles used in the performance of the contract. Coverage shall include all owned vehicles, all non-owned, and all hired vehicles. Limits of liability shall not be less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence combined single limit for bodily injury and property damage.
- 4. Commercial General Liability and Automobile Liability Required liability limits may be obtained by using an Excess/Umbrella Liability policy in addition to the primary liability policy(ies). If coverage limits are satisfied by an Excess and/or Umbrella policy, coverage must follow form of the primary liability policy(ies), including but not limited to additional insured and primary/non-contributory coverage.

Professional liability coverage with limits of liability of not less than \$1,000,000 per claim/aggregate. If this policy is claims made form, then the contractor shall be required to keep the policy in force, or purchase "tail" coverage, for a minimum of 3 years after the termination of this contract.

5. Additional insured endorsement on the commercial general liability insurance coverage, as described above, shall include an endorsement stating the following shall be **Additional Insured's**:

"The City of Royal Oak, all elected and appointed officials, all employees and volunteers, boards, commissions and/or authorities and their board members, employees and volunteers are additional insured." (On an ISO form B or broader or its equivalents.). Coverage afforded is considered primary and any other insurance the City of Royal Oak may have in effect shall be considered secondary and/or excess.

6. Cancellation notice. Policies, as described above, shall include an endorsement stating that thirty (30) days, ten (10) days for non-payment of premium, advance written notice of cancellation or non-renewal shall be sent to the Certificate Holder:

7. If any of the above coverages expire during the term of this contract, the consultant shall deliver renewal certificates, endorsements, and/or policies to City of Royal Oak at least ten (10) days prior to the expiration date. Copies of all policies mentioned above shall be furnished, if so requested.

8. Indemnification, except professional liability.

- a. To the fullest extent permitted by law, the consultant expressly agrees to indemnify and hold the city harmless against losses and liabilities arising out of personal injury, bodily injury or property damages, based upon negligent act, grossly negligent act or omission, or willful or wanton misconduct, by the consultant or anyone acting on the consultant's behalf, in connection with, or incidental to, the contract or the work to be performed, except that the consultant shall not be responsible to indemnify the city for losses or damages caused by or resulting from the city's negligence.

9. Indemnification, professional liability.

- a. The consultant expressly agrees to indemnify and hold the city harmless against all losses and liabilities arising out of personal injury, bodily injury or property damages to the extent of negligent act, grossly negligent act, error or omission of the consultant or anyone acting on the consultant's behalf, in connection with, or incidental to, the contract or work to be performed, except that the consultant shall not be responsible to indemnify the city for any losses or damages to the extent that same are caused by or result from the negligence of the city or any other person or entity.

- b. To the extent of the consultant's actual degree of fault, the consultant's obligation to indemnify and hold the city harmless shall include:

- i. The obligation to pay for the cost of defense, including reasonable attorney fees the city incurs from any such suit, action or proceeding, and;
 - ii. The obligation to pay any and all judgments which may be recovered in any such suit, action or proceeding and/or any reasonable expenses including, but not

limited to costs, attorney fees and settlement expenses which may be incurred, but only to the extent that such judgments and expenses are attributable to the consultant's actual fault.

10. The consultant agrees that it will not settle or resolve any claim or action against the consultant based upon its acts which includes, or may include, a claim or count against the city or its employees without coordinating with the city with respect to any and all claims or counts against the city except those based upon the gross negligence or willful or wanton misconduct of the city or its employees.
11. For the purpose of indemnity clauses in the agreement, "city" shall mean City of Royal Oak, its elected and appointed officials, employees working on behalf of the city; losses and liabilities shall mean loss, cost, expense, damage, liability or claims, whether groundless or not; personal injury, violation of property, or deprivation of any rights, privileges or immunities secured by the constitution and laws of the United States of America or the State of Michigan, for which the consultant may be held liable to its injured party in an action-at-law or a suit in equity or other proceedings for redress; bodily injury shall mean bodily injury, sickness or disease and mental injury which may be sustained or claimed by any person or persons; and property damage shall mean the damage and destruction of any property including the loss of use thereof.
12. This agreement shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Michigan, without regard to any conflicts of law principles. The parties agree that any action with respect to this agreement shall be brought in the courts of the State of Michigan and each party hereby submits itself to the exclusive jurisdiction of such courts.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The engineering division currently has three vacancies for civil engineers, with the city engineer being the only professional engineer on staff. Staff is actively seeking engineering candidates for these open positions, but there is a significant gap in resources available until engineers are hired and trained.

Staff has multiple infrastructure projects programmed for 2025 construction, and requires the assistance of consultants for survey, design and construction oversight. The survey and design work is typically performed in April through December of the year prior to construction. Staff requested pricing for the city's 2025 road projects from Nowak and Fraus Engineers (NFE) based on their consistent history of performing similar work in the past, and also because they have historically provided cost effective rates. Hiring a consultant will allow the city to move forward with the work programmed under the road millage renewal.

Attachment 1 summarizes the 2025 road projects and associated professional engineering fees quoted by NFE. This table also includes the related capital improvement plan numbers and total project budget for clarity. Staff compared this pricing to previous quotes and confirms that it is in-line with anticipated costs for professional engineering services. The proposed costs are within the city's budget for this work.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY The Cantata Academy Chorale is making a [request to be designated](#) as a recognized non-profit in the community. Such designation is required by the state for an organization to obtain a charitable gambling license. Primarily the request is made to support their efforts to raise funds for Cantata whose mission is to be a premier choral organization in the metropolitan Detroit area. Cantata fosters an environment where members can share their love of music with audiences in the community. The organization is funded through membership dues, ticket sales to their concert performances, and donations.

The next concert will be in Royal Oak on April 27, 2024, at the First United Methodist Church, their rehearsal and concert site. Additionally, they are collaborating with Royal Oak Leprechauns to sing the national anthem at a game during the 2024 season. At both of these events, they would like to conduct raffles to raise funds and require the City to recognize them with non-profit status to complete their application to the State of Michigan.

The city commission established criteria for such recognition by resolution adopted on October 4, 2010, and amended the policy by resolution on August 3, 2015. Criteria includes being based or making Royal Oak “a significant part of its service area”; making a substantial contribution to Royal Oak institutions or residents in the “form of donations, goods or services”; and must provide documentation proving it meets the non-profit status requirements.

The Cantata Academy Chorale has been a member of the Royal Oak community since its founding in 1961 performing concerts for the community each April or May and in December. They are based in Royal Oak and a member of the Royal Oak Chamber of Commerce. They have provided copies of their by-laws and Internal Revenue Service (IRS) tax-exempt 501(c)(3) certification for review and all of their paperwork is up to date and in order. EXECUTIVE

Beginning in 2015 the historical commission (HC) partnered with a paranormal investigative entity to offer ghost tours at the Orson Starr House Museum. The tours have proven to be a viable fundraiser for the HC and also a source of publicity for the Museum and by association, other events the HC hosts at the Museum. The HC is seeking authorization to resume a series of tours for the 2024 season.

Flyer Paranormal, LLC of Pickney, Michigan has provided the tours since 2022 and has done an outstanding job. Flyer is suggesting a schedule for 2024 which will begin with a tour on March 23, 2024. Tours will be conducted on Saturday per month through December 2024, with additional tours in October. Tours begin between 7:00 and 8:00p.m. and conclude before 2:00a.m. Each tour is limited to 12 participants, age 18 years and older; and group tours scheduled as requested and available.

Flyer and the HC is recommending raising the tour prices for the 2024 season to \$55.00 individual rate and \$300.00 group rate. The City receives fifty-percent from each ticket sold; individual and group.

When tour dates are finalized, the HC will secure permission from the Salvation Army for the use of the parking lot as they do for all events at the Museum, which then alleviates any parking issues for the surrounding neighborhoods.

Be it further resolved, the Mayor and City Clerk are hereby authorized to execute the City of Royal Oak Orson Starr House Museum Use Agreement.

CITY OF ROYAL OAK ORSON STARR HOUSE MUSEUM USE AGREEMENT

This Agreement is entered into this _____ day of _____, 2024, between the City of Royal Oak, a Michigan Municipal Corporation with offices at 203 South Troy Street, Royal Oak, MI 48067 (the "City"), and "Flyer Paranormal, LLC", with offices at 10674 Revere, Pickney, Michigan 49286 (the "User").

WHEREAS, the User desires to host "paranormal ghost tours and investigations" ("tours") of the Orson Starr House Museum, at 3123 North Main Street, Royal Oak, Michigan 48073; and

WHEREAS, the Orson Starr House Museum is owned by the City; and

WHEREAS, the City and City Historical Commission agree to allow the User to host tours at the Orson Starr House Museum, subject to the terms and conditions of this agreement;

THEREFORE, the City and User agree as follows:

1. **TERMS OF USE.** The User may use the Orson Starr House Museum ("Museum") to offer tours between March 23 to December 31, 2024, starting at 7:00 p.m. and ending at 2:00 a.m., on dates to be determined by mutual agreement of the User and the City's Historical Commission. The User shall surrender the premises to the City in the same condition as received. The User shall be responsible for any damage or theft during the tour and costs for repair and/or replacement. User staff shall be on the grounds during the entire time of the tour.
2. **FEES AND ADMISSION.** The User shall charge admission for a tour limited to 12 persons at one time for a fee of fifty-five dollars (\$55.00) per person. User shall pay to the City of Royal Oak twenty-seven dollars and fifty-cents (\$27.50) per person and retain twenty-seven dollars and fifty-cents (\$27.50) per person. The User will also offer group tours charging a rate of three hundred dollars (\$300). For the group tours, the User shall pay to the City of Royal Oak one-hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00) and retain one-hundred and fifty dollars (\$150.00). All tour participants shall have reached at least eighteen (18) years of age and signed a waiver, releasing the User and the City, and its elected officials, appointed officials, staff, and volunteers of any and all liability.
3. **USE OF PREMISES.** The User agrees that the premises shall be used only for the tour, designated by the User as a "paranormal ghost tour and investigation." The User shall be allowed use of the Museum only during the tour hours listed in paragraph 1, with reasonable time for set-up and closing before and after the tour.
4. **ASSIGNMENT AND SUBLetting.** User shall not assign, sublet, or allow use of any portion of the Museum to or by any other persons or entity, without the prior approval of the City.
5. **INDEMNITY, DEFEND AND HOLD HARMLESS.** To the extent permitted by law, the User agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the City, including its elected and appointed officials, all employees and volunteers, all boards, commissions and/or authorities and their board members, employees and volunteers, harmless from any and all claims, demands and rights of action of every name, nature and description, whether arising under state or Federal statutes, or at common law, for injury, alleged injury or death to persons whether employees of the City, or

agents or employees of the User, or to third parties, and for damage or alleged damage to property regardless of to whom it may belong or in whose custody it may be, arising through, on account of, or out of the permission to use the Museum herein granted, no matter how caused, whether by the negligence of the City, its agents, employees or otherwise. The User agrees that in case a claim is made, or a suit is instituted against the City for such loss, injury or damage, the User will, upon notice from the City, settle, adjust or defend the same at its sole cost and expense, without expense to the City, and shall pay any judgment rendered therein, including any court costs.

6. INSURANCE. The parties understand and agree that the City has and is self-insured for the activity and use proposed under this Agreement. However, in addition, as a condition precedent to the use of the Museum by the User, the City shall be added as a named insured to User's general liability insurance policy. The User shall carry insurance coverage in the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) for general liability. Umbrella coverage in the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) may also be used if the general liability coverage is less than one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00). Furthermore, the User agrees to reimburse the City for any deductible costs or claims expenses arising from any claims or suits filed against the City.

The User shall provide to the City, as the Certificate Holder, a Certificate of Insurance for the use period, with an additional insured on the certificate of insurance that shall read as follows:

"City of Royal Oak, including all elected and appointed officials, all employees and volunteers, all boards, commissions and/or authorities and their board members, employees and volunteers."

The cancellation notice on the certificate of insurance must read as follows:

"Should any of the above-described policies be cancelled before the expiration date thereof, notice of cancellation will be provided to the Certificate Holder in accordance with the provisions of the policy."

6. USER RIGHTS. The User shall have exclusive rights to host tours at the Museum during the tour period described in paragraph 1 at the days and times as mutually agreed to by the User and the City's Historical Commission..

7. RULES AND REGULATIONS / DEFAULT. By signing this Agreement, the User agrees to abide at all times by all state laws, local ordinances, and any rules and regulations and any standards promulgated by the City. The User understands and acknowledges that a violation of these rules, standards or directions can result in default and termination of this agreement.

WHEREOF, each of the parties hereto has caused this Agreement to be executed in its name and behalf by its duly authorized representative as of the date first written above.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

A petition was received to pave E. Parent Avenue from Longfellow Avenue to the dead end, with 21-foot wide, 7-inch thick concrete pavement by special assessment. The signed petition is provided as attachment 1.

Two properties have side lot frontage along this portion of E. Parent Avenue, and both properties have signed the petition in favor of paving, representing 100% of the district as illustrated in attachment 2. The city owns the south half of roadway frontage (Lawson Park), and was not included in the petition.

The petitioner requested a narrower roadway width of 21 feet to protect three mature trees along the north side of E. Parent Avenue. This will require that one side of the paved roadway be signed for no parking, and this item will be presented separately through the Royal Oak Citizens Traffic Committee.

Special assessment standard resolution 1 is attached and is recommended for adoption.


Economic Comments

- Market Review:** The Robinson Leading Economic Index barely budged in February and remains in contraction territory. Positive trends in housing and equity markets were offset by weaker-than-expected manufacturing numbers and consumer sentiment.
- Inflation:** In 2022, when it became a consensus view that inflation had peaked, the inflation debate moved to the future "path" of inflation and specifically, the question of where post-COVID inflation would "settle". We may be close to finding that answer after inflation, measured by a couple of different metrics, has plateaued following steep declines. Both headline CPI and CPI Supercore Services (a recent Fed favorite measure) have essentially been flat since June of 2023, while services inflation has actually increased over the last 3 months (see bottom left).
- Employment:** Since job openings and hirings reached all-time highs in 2021, the activity and turnover in the labor market has rolled over for 2 years straight. While the post-COVID activity in 2021 was unsustainable, we are now approaching levels in line with 2014 and even near the bottom of the '01 tech bubble. When you adjust the number of job hirings for the total level of private employees in the economy, it is clear that the rate of hirings has slowed considerably (see bottom right). This paints a contrasting picture with some other, oft-cited strong employment metrics. If this number reflects a change in the behavior of businesses willing to hire, any meaningful uptick in unemployment may take longer than expected to work itself through the system.


Robinson Leading Economic Index

Adjusted Private Job Hirings





Federal Reserve Stance



In February, the bond market significantly readjusted its expectations for the Fed Funds rate for 2024. Entering the month, markets were pricing in six interest rate cuts of 0.25% each for the year and by the end had reduced their forecasts to only three. The change in expectations was primarily the result of stronger than expected January inflation metrics, though continued low unemployment claims, and recovering manufacturing numbers played a part as well.



The increase in yields caused the 2-Year Treasury to have negative performance in February.



Nominal retail sales measure the total revenue from goods sold, while real retail sales will adjust for inflation and reflect the actual volume of goods sold. Both metrics were on the same trajectory pre-Covid, but over the past couple of years, nominal sales have greatly outpaced real sales. This calls into question the true strength of the consumer as the number of actual units bought has plateaued.

The Royal Oak Police Department has received a request from Royal Oak Ramen, LLC, d/b/a Jinya Ramen Bar, located at 129 S. Main Street, to approve a new Plan of Operation in connection with a new restaurant and proposed transfer of a Resort Class C Liquor License with Sunday sales at the location.

As indicated in the accompanying memorandum and attachments from Lt. Karly Renaud, the applicant is proposing to open a new restaurant at 129 S. Main Street and, if approved, will be purchasing a Resort Class C Liquor License, with Sunday sales, from a location in Kalamazoo, Michigan. The applicants are *not* seeking an Entertainment Permit or Dance Permit as part of this proposed plan of operation, at this time.

The Royal Oak Police Department has received a request from Royal Oak Ramen, LLC to review a new proposed plan of operation to be located at 129 S. Main Street, Royal Oak, Michigan. The Resort Class C Liquor License with Sunday Sales (p.m.) Permit is currently held at Eastland Bowl Inc., 5570 Gull Road, Kalamazoo, Michigan. The applicants are seeking an SDM License and Sunday Sales Permit (a.m.). The applicants will be doing business as Jinya Ramen Bar.

Royal Oak Ramen, LLC is owned by the Kent Ward Living Trust (33.34%), James Carmody III Living Trust (33.33%), and Michael Bailey (33.33%). The applicants will purchase the Resort Class C liquor license for \$105,000. The applicants will be leasing the building from South Main Realty, LLC for \$15,558 a month. Royal Oak Ramen, LLC will spend approximately \$1,395,000 on renovations, fixtures, furniture, equipment and inventory. The project will be funded by \$1,500,000 in capital contributions (\$500,000 from each member). The applicants anticipate opening in the Fall of 2024.

Jinya Ramen Bar is a franchise and will be the first location in Michigan. The applicants indirectly hold stake in 52 Buffalo Wild Wing restaurants and opened their first restaurant in 1995. A Michigan Liquor Control Commission check of businesses operated by the applicants revealed several violations. The attached spread sheet lists the location, business and the violation that was issued.

Local law enforcement agencies were contacted to inquire about any issues they may have with the Buffalo Wild Wings locations in their respective jurisdictions. The following departments were contacted:

- East Lansing Police Department
- Mt. Pleasant Police Department
- Oakland County Sheriff's Office
- Grand Rapids Police Department
- Chesterfield Police Department
- St. Clair Shores Police Department
- Ann Arbor Police Department

None of the departments reported any issues with these Buffalo Wild Wings locations.

The applicants will employ an internal candidate from one of their other restaurants as the general manager for Jinya Ramen Bar.

If approved, Jinya Ramen Bar will operate as a full-service Japanese restaurant and bar. The concept involves serving Japanese food consisting of ramen bowls, salads, small plates, and rice bowls. The applicants anticipate the food to alcohol ratio to be 88% food to 12% alcohol. The proposed hours of operation are from 11:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. Sunday - Thursday and 11:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m., Friday and Saturday. The applicants may request to open earlier during special events with prior approval from the chief of police.

The Jinya Ramen Bar will have approximately 5,400 usable square feet. The total proposed interior seating will be for 175 patrons, which includes 21 seats at the bar and 9 seats at the ramen bar. The applicants do not request an Entertainment Permit or a Dance Permit. The applicants will have piped or canned music that will be played. The sound will be restricted to a level which will not adversely impact neighboring and adjoining property owners and Jinya Ramen Bar will comply with the provisions of the sound ordinance.

Final overall capacity will be set by the police department after recommendations from both the building and fire departments.

If approved, the applicants will have to comply with all planning, zoning, and building requirements and restrictions.

My findings indicate the applicants meet the requirements necessary to be granted this request. The applicants are experienced restaurateurs that have successfully opened and operated numerous Buffalo Wild Wings throughout Michigan. The police department does not anticipate this request to cause any additional strain on police resources. The police department does not object to this request.

Preamble: We have received a copy of Royal Oak City Ordinances 430-1 through 430-12, the City of Royal Oak's ordinances to establish general policy for liquor licenses and permits, understand its provisions, and will be governed by them. The following Plan of Operation is developed in keeping with the spirit and intent of this ordinance.

I. HOURS OF OPERATION: Proposed hours of operation for the business are Sunday-Thursday from 11:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m. and Friday and Saturday from 11:00 a.m. to 11:00 p.m. Last call for alcohol service will be 15 minutes before closing. The kitchen will remain open until closing. Jinya Ramen Bar may open earlier for special occasions, such as St. Patrick's Day, Cinco de Mayo, Dream Cruise week, and Arts, Beats and Eats with the prior approval of the Chief of Police.

II. FORMAT: Jinya Ramen Bar will serve Japanese fare. Jinya Ramen Bar's menu will offer lunch and dinner options such as Ramen Bowls, Salads, Small Plates, Mini Tacos, Rice Bowls and a kid's menu.

There will be total interior dining seating for 175 patrons, which includes 21 seats at the bar and 9 seats at the ramen bar (similar to a sushi bar).

The square footage of the establishment is approximately 5,400. The ratio of food sales to alcohol sales is anticipated to be 88/12. The proposed floor plan is attached hereto as Exhibit A. The final occupancy will be approved by the Royal Oak Police Department.

It is agreed that we will not change the format or type of business without written approval of the City Commission. This includes changing from a full-service restaurant to a bar where food service is reduced, etc.

III. CODE COMPLIANCE: The premises will comply with all applicable health, safety, building, sanitation, electrical, plumbing, and fire codes, as well as zoning requirements.

IV. SOUND: Piped or canned music ("Sound") will be restricted to a level which will not adversely impact neighboring and adjoining property owners, and Jinya Ramen Bar will strictly comply with the City and the provisions of the Sound Ordinance. Jinya Ramen Bar pledges its full cooperation with the Police Department and/or adjacent and adjoining property owners in this regard.

V. PLAN OF OPERATION: It is acknowledged that under Section 430-4(A), the business shall be operated in accordance with an approved Plan of Operation. Changing the operation of the business in any manner inconsistent with the approved Plan of Operation is a violation of the ordinance and the rules of the City. Any change to the Plan of Operation must be approved by the City Commission prior to it being placed into effect on the business premises.

VI. SECURITY: Security for the customer, building, and community are the first priorities for the company. Jinya Ramen Bar will undertake whatever measures are necessary to maintain, secure, and supervise its customers and premises.

VII. PARKING: This establishment is in the Royal Oak Downtown area. There are various parking lots/structures and parallel parking on the city streets within walking distance to the building. It is expected that many of the customers may walk or bike to the business.

Employees will park in areas designated by management.

VIII. ALCOHOL MANAGEMENT: The establishment will strictly obey all rules, regulations, and ordinances established by the City of Royal Oak and the State of Michigan Liquor Control Commission. There will be neither service nor consumption of alcoholic beverages by minors at any time. No alcohol will be sold, or permitted to be sold, on a commission basis by any person. The establishment fully participates in a approved management training program and will continue such participation in that program or a similarly recognized program approved by the Royal Oak Police Chief. TIPS/TAM certification cards for all employees shall be available for inspection by the Police Department 35 days after the date of hire.

In addition, the following policies are enforced at Jinya Ramen Bar:

- No alcoholic beverages are allowed on the premises other than what is dispensed by the establishment.
- All staff will pay attention and stay alert to observable clues displayed by an intoxicated individual such as: (a) impaired reflexes, (b) impaired coordination, (c) reduced judgment and inhibitions, (d) impaired vision, or physical behavior.
- All staff will be alert to potential problems in their respective areas at the facility.
- All staff will be polite and courteous to the intoxicated individual(s). Be knowledgeable as to when to request assistance from additional facility staff.
- Patrons who appear to be under 30 years of age or younger will be asked to show proper valid identification. Signs will be posted at serving locations. Patrons must produce proper identification.
 - All patrons under 21 years of age - service will be refused alcohol service.
 - Check 'State Seal' and other markings. Check for damage or alterations to identification card.
 - Do not return falsified identification cards. Call management immediately.
- If a patron shows signs of intoxication, then refuse service, politely explain policy, suggest non-alcoholic purchase, and call for management immediately.
- If a patron is purchasing on behalf of someone else who appears less than 30 years old, then request to see identification of recipient or contact supervisory personnel who will seek patron(s) out. Refuse service to minors. Inform all parties involved that the policy

allows for ejection from premises, and notification to the police department of illegal activity.

- Alcohol dispensing may be restricted to one of the following practices, or any combination thereof:
 - No sales to intoxicated persons.
 - No sales without proper identification
 - Limited alcoholic choices if necessary
 - When in doubt, do not serve - call supervisor.
- Observe all patrons leaving the property. No alcoholic beverages are allowed to leave the facility or property.
- Staff will approach any patron appearing to be impaired and leaving the property. Determine if they are driving, and if so, attempt to persuade them not to drive and request a non-impaired companion to drive. If unable, staff will refer patron to bus or taxi service.
- Supervisory and management personnel will complete documentation of any alcoholic related incidents at the end of the event. Information will be disseminated accordingly and forwarded to the Royal Oak Police Department.
- Jinya Ramen Bar shall provide free and/or at reduced prices non-alcoholic beverages to all designated drivers.

IX. REFUSE DISPOSAL: The establishment will dispose of refuse in enclosed dumpster(s), with locked lids. Pickup will be a minimum of 2 times per week. A water line with spigot will be provided to clean dumpster enclosure as necessary.

X. GENERAL: Every effort will be made to maintain positive relationships with adjacent and nearby businesses, as well as cooperation with all City departments. Every effort will be made to solve any problems which may arise.



Proposed Amendment to the Royal Oak Code of Ordinances to amend marihuana regulations

March 6, 2024

On the agenda for your consideration, for first reading, is a proposed amendment to the Royal Oak Code of Ordinances that would amend Section 435-4D(7), of Article I, Recreational Marihuana Establishments, of Chapter 435, Marihuana, of the Code of Ordinances, City of Royal Oak, Michigan, to add provisions for obtaining additional extensions of a municipal license for marihuana establishments in the City.

Presently, the City Code provides for up to two (2) six (6) month extensions to obtain a municipal license for a marihuana establishment, provided that the awarded license holder is either actively engaged in a construction of the establishment with an unexpired building permit or all building improvements are completed, and the license holder is awaiting final approval of state licensure. Due to the uncertain nature of many facets of the industry, the initial time periods under the original ordinance to extend the licenses was an unknown factor to the City when it drafted those specific ordinance provisions.

Unfortunately, due to circumstances beyond the control of one or more license holders in the City, they have experienced unforeseen delays in certain aspects of their attempt to build certain portions of their establishments. As such, they have requested a mechanism to extend the period in which to obtain a license as long as they have an active building permit and are progressing with the construction of their establishment.

Both a redline and a clean version of the proposed amendment are attached for your review and consideration. As you can see from the redline version, the proposed revision is a minor modification to the same section for extensions that the City Commission approved a little less than one (1) year ago. The modification would add an additional two (2) extensions on top of the first and second two (2) extensions that presently are provided for in the ordinance. As mentioned above, the licensee would be required to maintain all relevant building permits and be engaged in active construction activities for the extensions to be granted. Moreover, the licensee would also be required to pay the application fee for each license, for each requested extension, which equates to paying the license fee every six (6) months for an extension, as opposed to annually for a renewal of an issued license.

AMENDMENT TO THE CODE OF ORDINANCES

An Ordinance to amend the 2008 Ordinance Adopting the Royal Oak Code of Ordinances, codifying and adopting a new Code of the City of Royal Oak by amending Section 435-4D(7), of Article I, Recreational Marihuana Establishments of Chapter 435, Marihuana, of the Code of Ordinances, City of Royal Oak, Michigan, to add provisions for obtaining additional extensions of a municipal license for marihuana establishments in the City.

THE CITY OF ROYAL OAK ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. Amendment.

That Section 435-4D(7), of Article I, Recreational Marihuana Establishments of Chapter 435, Marihuana, of the Code of Ordinances, City of Royal Oak, Michigan, is hereby amended, to read as follows:

Sec. 435-4D(7).

(7) If all conditions of this article have been met, the City Clerk shall issue the municipal license to the applicant.

(a) All municipal licenses issued have the following stipulations:

- [1] Issuance of license qualification by the State of Michigan for the municipal license holder under state law and the City of Royal Oak receiving a copy of that license qualification prior to occupancy.
- [2] Issuance of final certificate of occupancy for the municipally licensed premises by the Community Development Department. All construction must be in accordance with applicable zoning ordinances, building codes, and any other applicable state or local laws, rules, or regulations.
- [3] For processors and Class A, B, and C growers and microbusinesses proposing to connect to or to contribute to the POTW, a wastewater discharge permit.
- [4] Issuance of final approval by the State of Michigan and the City of Royal Oak receiving a copy of the final approval prior to the business opening.

- (b) A municipal license holder has one year from the date of issuance to meet all stipulations of the municipal license. If all stipulations are not met in this time frame, the municipal license is revoked and considered denied. A municipal license holder may request one extension not to exceed six months from the license's original expiration date, which may be granted by the City Clerk.
- (c) If a municipal license holder obtains a first extension but has not met all stipulations of the municipal license at the end of the extended period, it may request up to four additional

subsequent extensions not to exceed six months from the end of each extended period, upon payment of the non-refundable application fee for municipal license renewal. The City Clerk may grant an extension only upon receipt of written evidence supplied by the municipal license holder that either of the following conditions exists:

- [1] The license holder has a current, unexpired building permit and is actively engaged in construction of the approved improvements on the municipally licensed property. For purposes of this subparagraph, "actively engaged in construction" means that the license holder demonstrates that workers are on site performing construction and are being paid for their work, and that the license holder has complied with all conditions of the building permit, including but not limited to obtaining regular, required inspections.
- [2] All approved improvements on the municipally licensed property are complete, the license holder has applied to the Department for a state marihuana license, and the license holder has not received a response to its application from the Department. If the municipal license holder receives a state license from the Department, the renewal fee paid with the request for a second extension shall be valid for one year from the effective date of the state license.

If neither of the foregoing conditions exists, the municipal license is revoked and considered denied at the end of the first extension period.

SECTION 2. Repealer.

All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, in conflict with this ordinance are repealed only to the extent necessary to give this ordinance full force and effect.

SECTION 3. Severability.

Should any section, subdivision, clause, or phrase of this ordinance be declared by the courts to be invalid, the validity of the ordinance as a whole, or in part, shall not be affected other than the part invalidated.

SECTION 4. Savings.

All proceedings pending and all rights and liabilities existing, acquired or incurred at the time this ordinance takes effect, are saved and may be consummated according to the law in force when they were commenced.

SECTION 5. Effective Date.

This ordinance as ordered shall take effect ten (10) days after its adoption and upon publication.

SECTION 6. Inspection.

AMENDMENT TO THE CODE OF ORDINANCES

An Ordinance to amend the 2008 Ordinance Adopting the Royal Oak Code of Ordinances, codifying and adopting a new Code of the City of Royal Oak by amending Sections 435-2C, 435-5A(2),(9)&(10), of Article I, Recreational Marihuana Establishments of Chapter 435, Marihuana, of the Code of Ordinances, City of Royal Oak, Michigan, to adopt provisions for the granting of special licenses for marihuana event organizers and temporary marihuana events consistent with the City's Zoning Ordinances.

THE CITY OF ROYAL OAK ORDAINS:

SECTION 1. Amendment.

That Sections 435-2C, 435-5A(2), (9)&(10) of Article I, Recreational Marihuana Establishments of Chapter 435, Marihuana, of the Code of Ordinances, City of Royal Oak, Michigan are hereby amended, to read as follows:

Sec. 435-2C.

No person shall operate a marihuana establishment at any time or any location within the city unless a currently effective municipal license for that person at that location has been issued under this article. No marihuana establishments are allowed nor shall a municipal license be considered or granted for those activities and facilities defined as a "special license," under Mich. Admin. Code R. 420.21, being a state license described under Section 8 of the MRTMA and issued by the state pursuant to Section 9 of the MRTMA, MCLA 333.27958 and 333.27959, as may be amended, including, but not limited to, designated consumption establishment, excess marihuana grower, and any special license types hereafter recognized by the state, except that the city commission may grant a special license for a marihuana event organizer and a temporary marihuana event.

Sec. 435-5A(2).

Permanent location. Each permanent marihuana establishment shall be operated from the municipally licensed premises on the municipally licensed property. No permanent marihuana establishment shall be municipally licensed to operate from a movable, mobile or transitory location, except for a municipally licensed or licensed secure transporter when engaged in the lawful transport of marihuana. No person under the age of 18 shall be allowed to enter into the municipally licensed premises without a parent or legal guardian.

Sec. 435-5A(9).

Use of marihuana. The sale, consumption or use of alcohol or tobacco products on the municipally licensed premises is prohibited. Smoking or consumption of controlled substances, including marihuana, on the municipally licensed premises is prohibited except for a properly licensed temporary marihuana event.

Sec. 435-5A(10).

Indoor operation. All activities of marihuana establishment, including, without limitation, distribution, growth, cultivation, or the sale of marihuana, and all other related activity municipally

licensed under the municipal license holder's license or municipal license must occur indoors. The marihuana establishment's operation and design shall minimize any impact to adjacent uses, including the control of any odor by maintaining and operating an air filtration system so that no odor is detectable outside the municipally licensed premises. No consumption of marihuana shall take place on the premises of a marihuana establishment except for a properly licensed temporary marihuana event.

SECTION 2. Repealer.

All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, in conflict with this ordinance are repealed only to the extent necessary to give this ordinance full force and effect.

SECTION 3. Severability.

Should any section, subdivision, clause, or phrase of this ordinance be declared by the courts to be invalid, the validity of the ordinance as a whole, or in part, shall not be affected other than the part invalidated.

SECTION 4. Savings.

All proceedings pending and all rights and liabilities existing, acquired or incurred at the time this ordinance takes effect, are saved and may be consummated according to the law in force when they were commenced.
