




Football





Teachers



Teachers




Art








Senior Officers

CROSS COUNTRY— DENNIS TRUBY





Four years of "debatable" work has won Kim Garvin (3L) considerable acclaim. Kim has earned her place of honor by excelling in various debate tournaments. She




