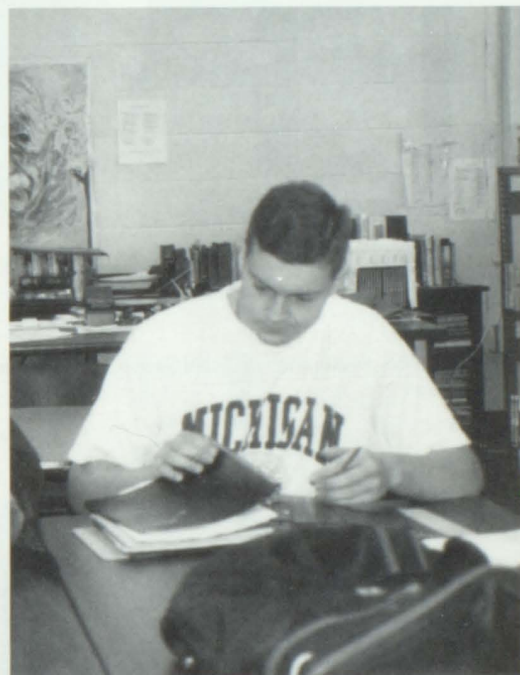

Whatever your pleasure; either hanging out with friends, working, or just relaxing be sure to have fun because before you know it it's already Monday!



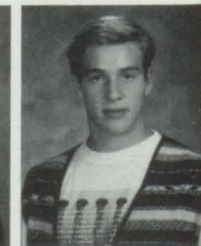

"Friends are an important part of high school. School would never be the same without close friends with whom you can talk about anything and everything," said Nicole Hanna.



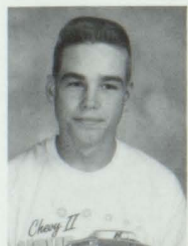

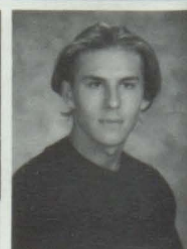
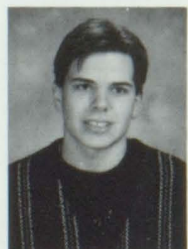

Not all dream vacations are only dreams. So remember always dream and hope because life may surprise you and your dreams may come true.

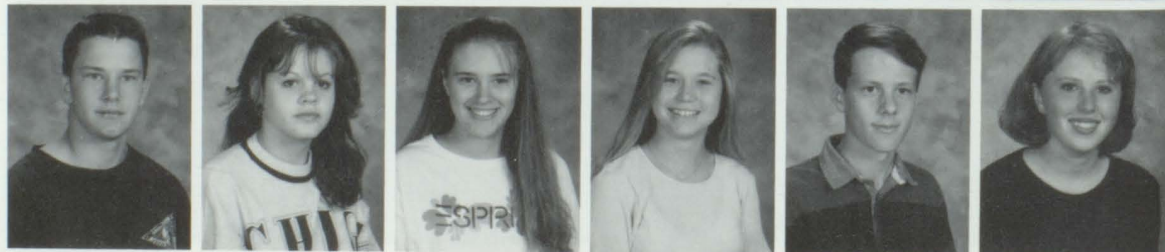

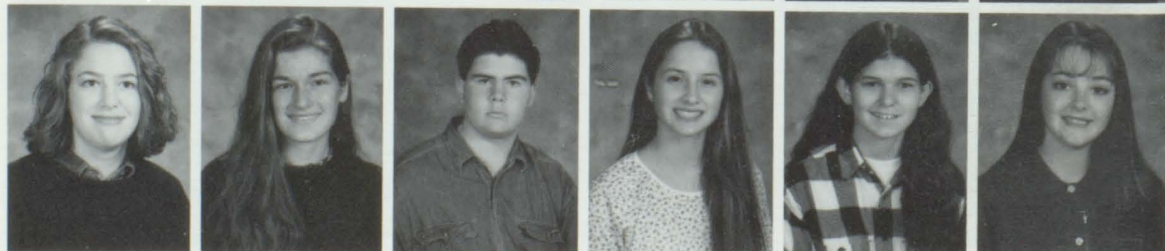

For these sophomores caught in between being new faces and two year's from graduating, enjoy turning sixteen, and dream about becoming an upperclassman.

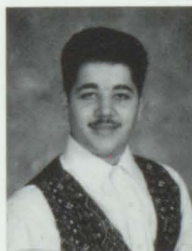

"The cafeteria really isn't as bad as a lot of people say," said Albiona Muftari, "I actually like the food."

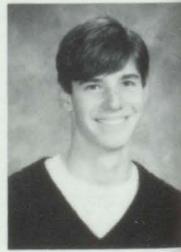
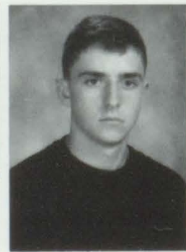

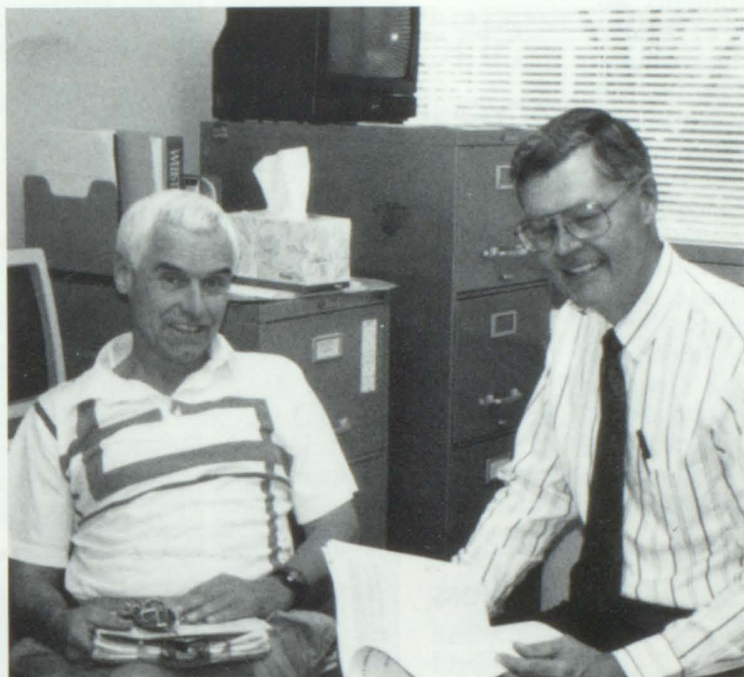

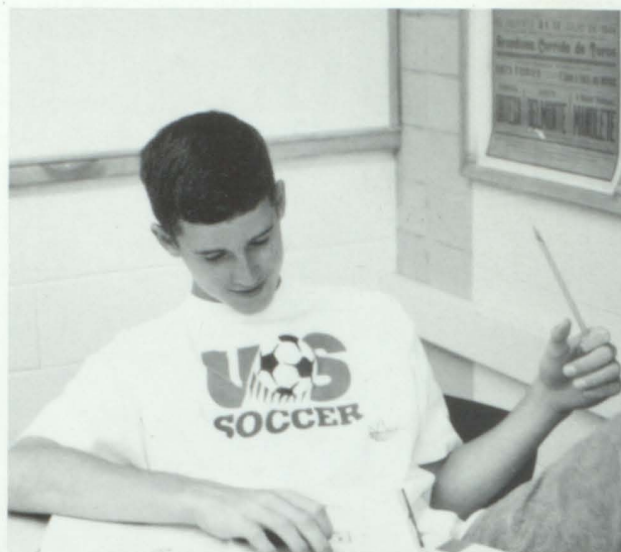
Hoermann. "It's hard at first, but it becomes easier as it goes—it's well worth it," commented Justin Watts. Most students take a foreign language

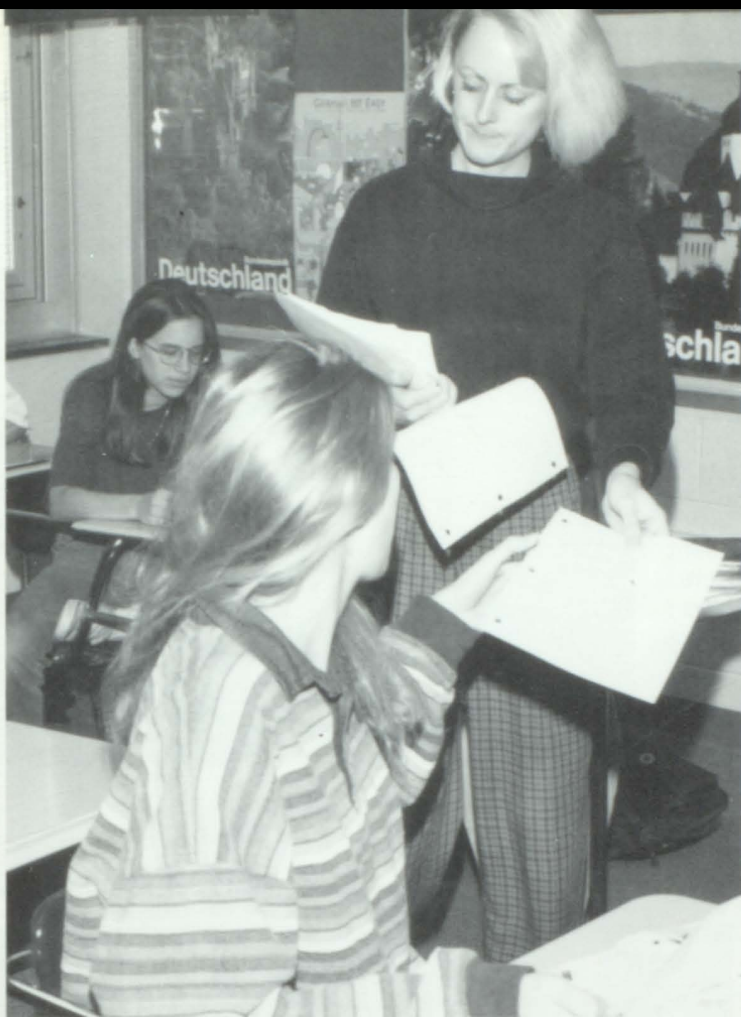

Kris Adamczyk, a junior stated that "My Geography class was fun.

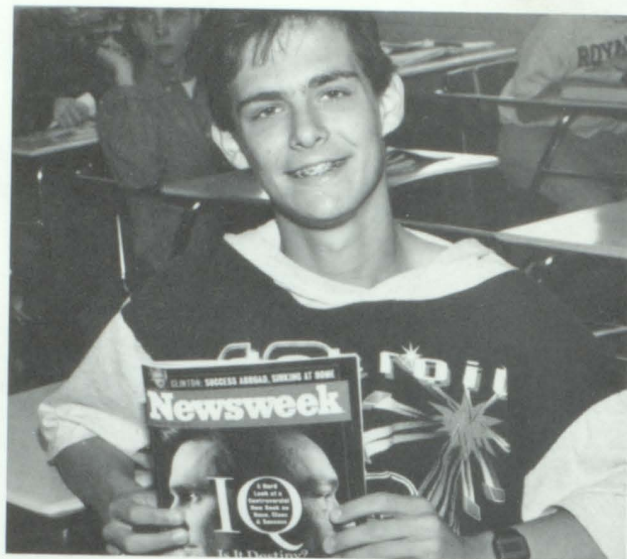

# SCIENCE AT ITS BEST

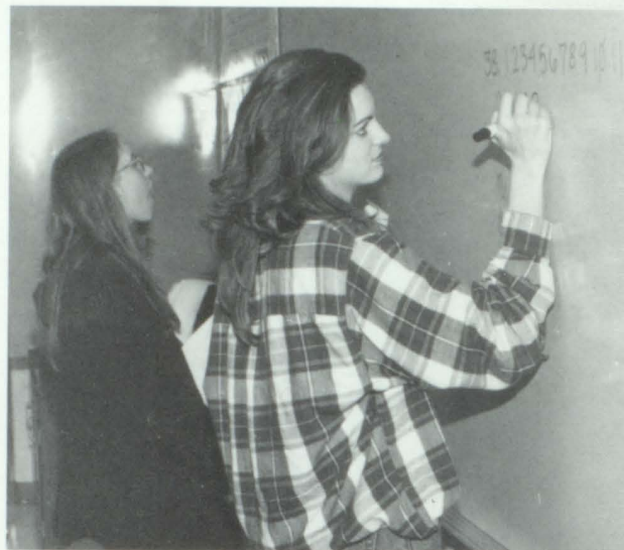

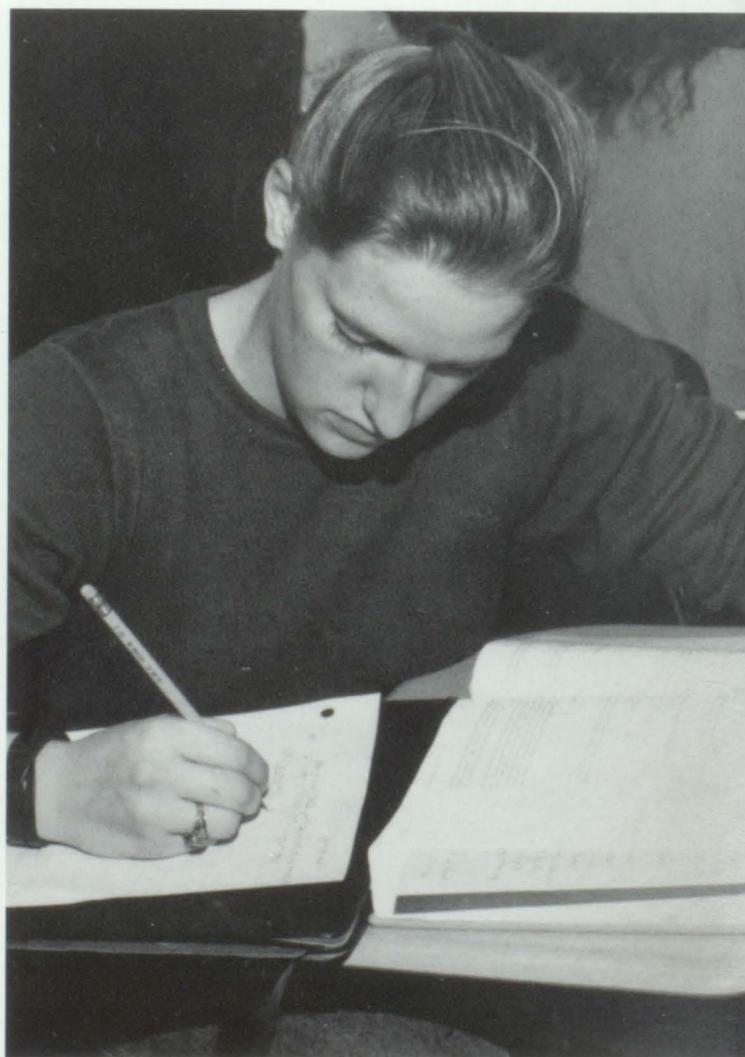

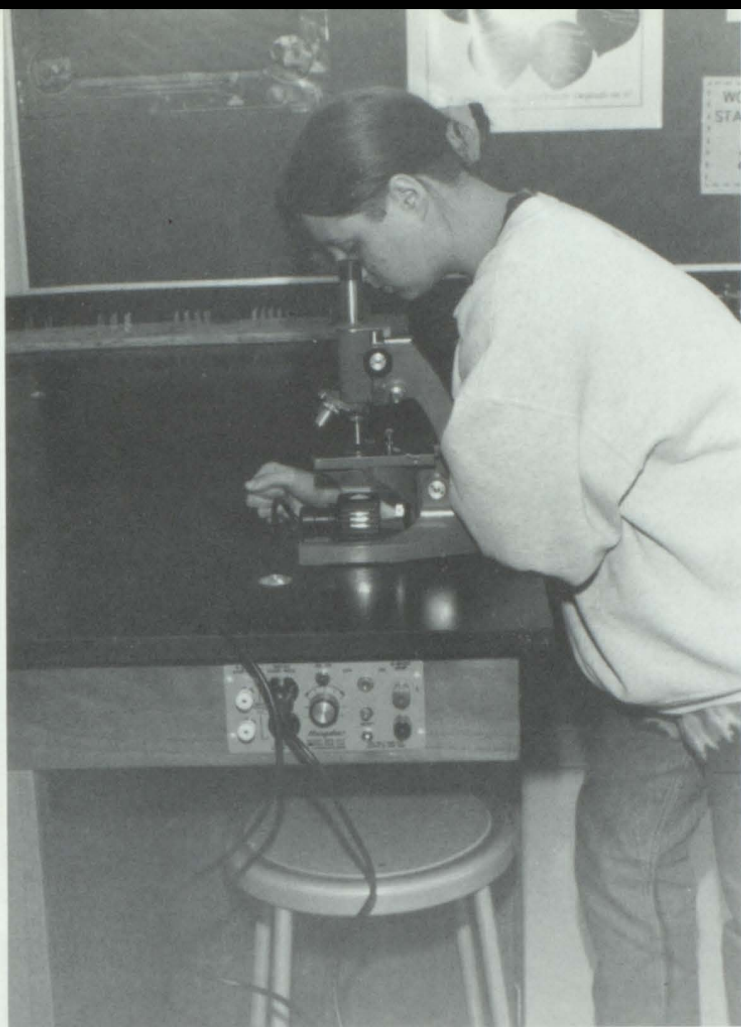

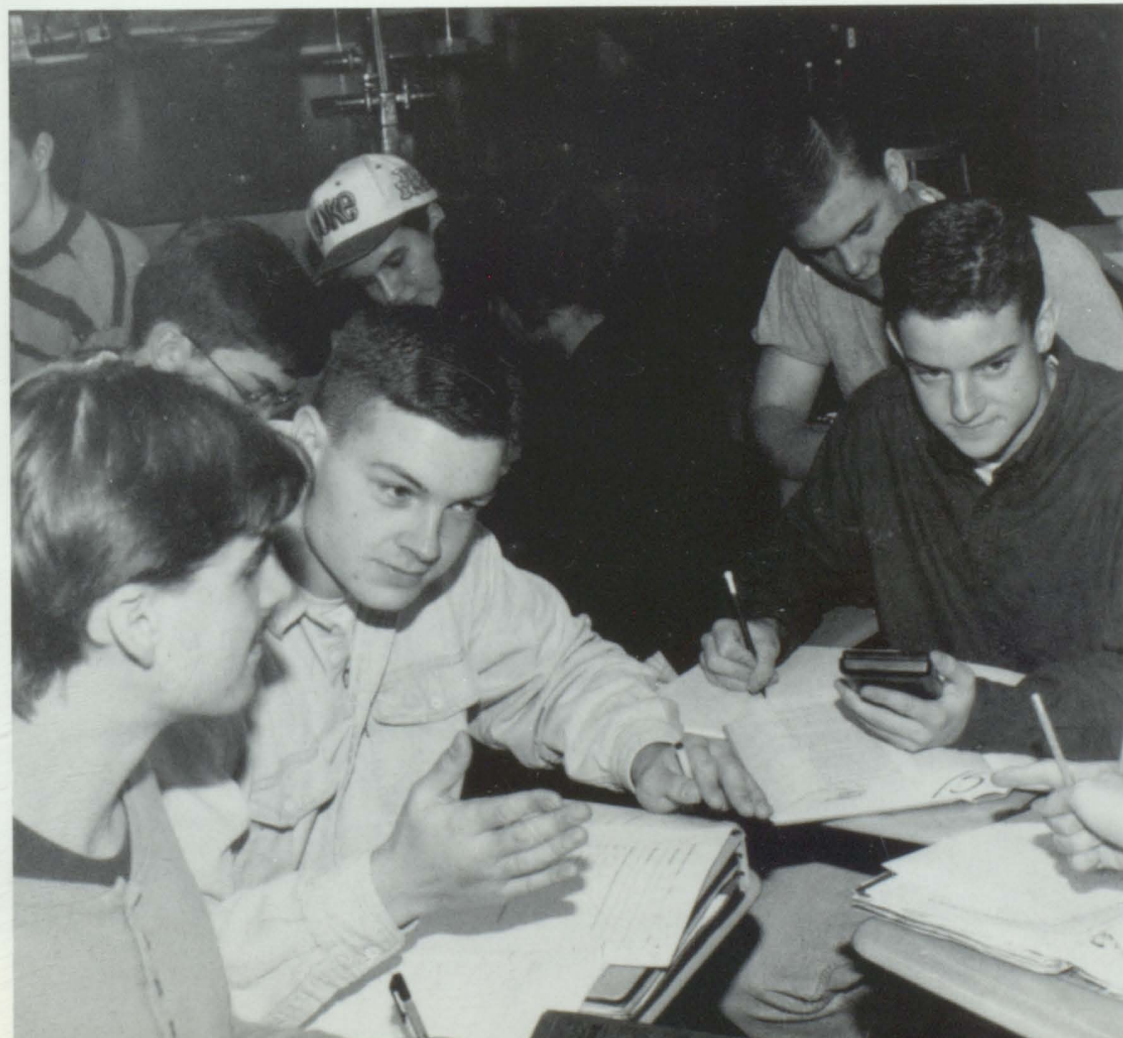

At Kimball High School there are unlimited amounts of information accessible to the future engineer or computer user.

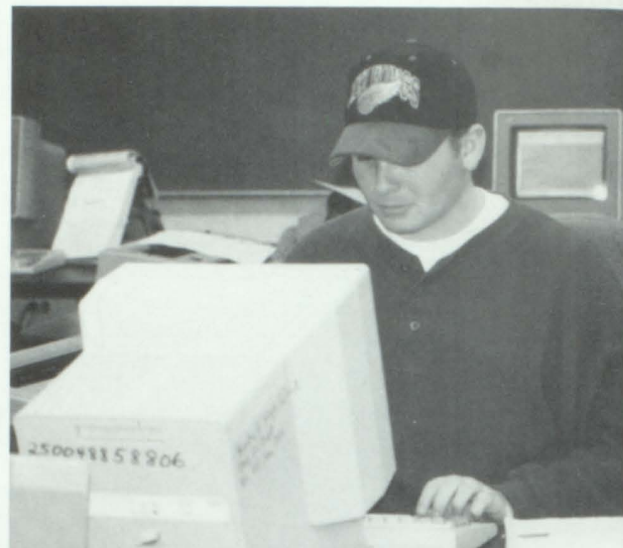

learned that the easier it is for the students to find information, the more likely they are to use the material," stated Media Specialist Ms. Roberta Magid.

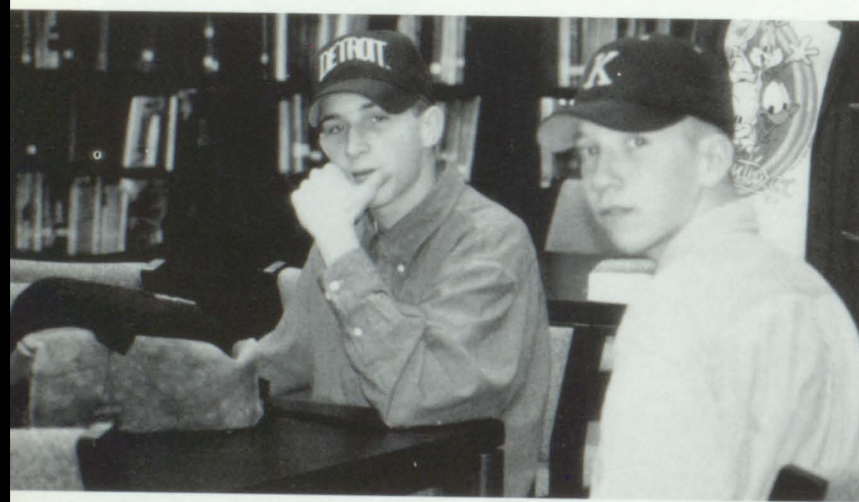

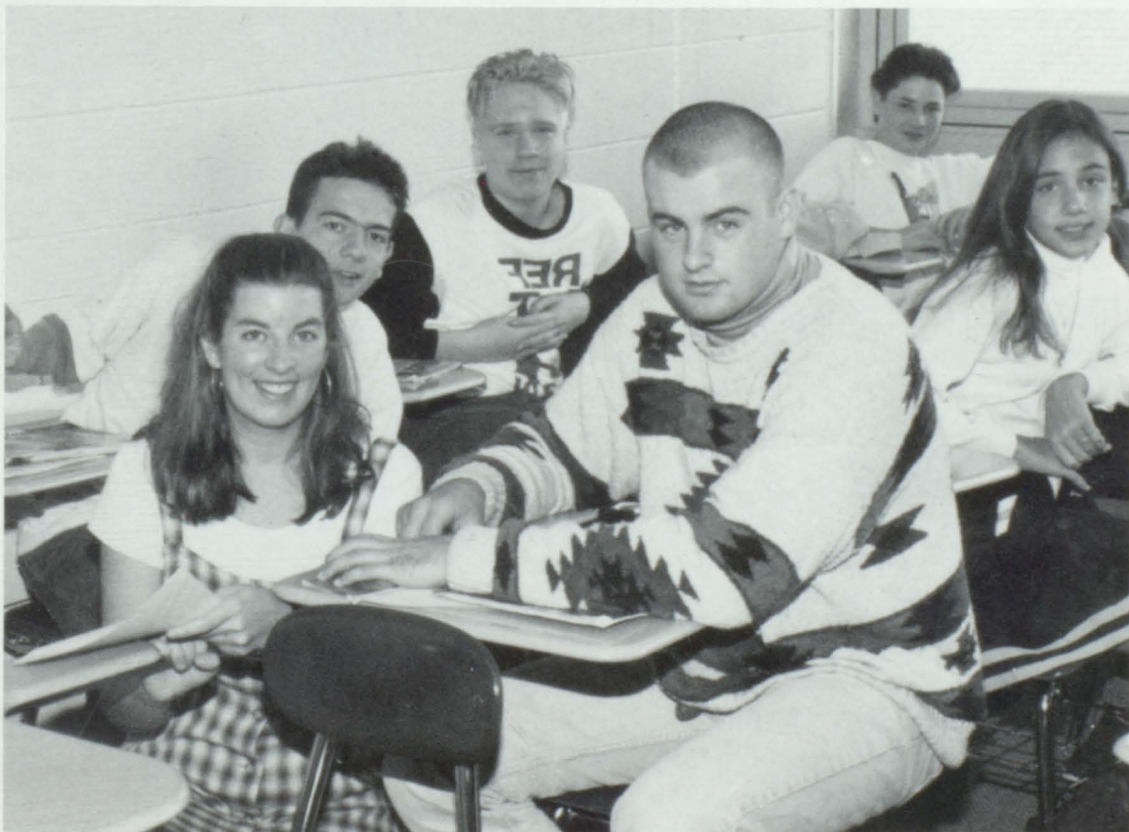

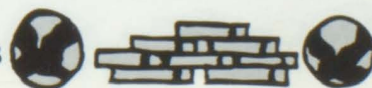

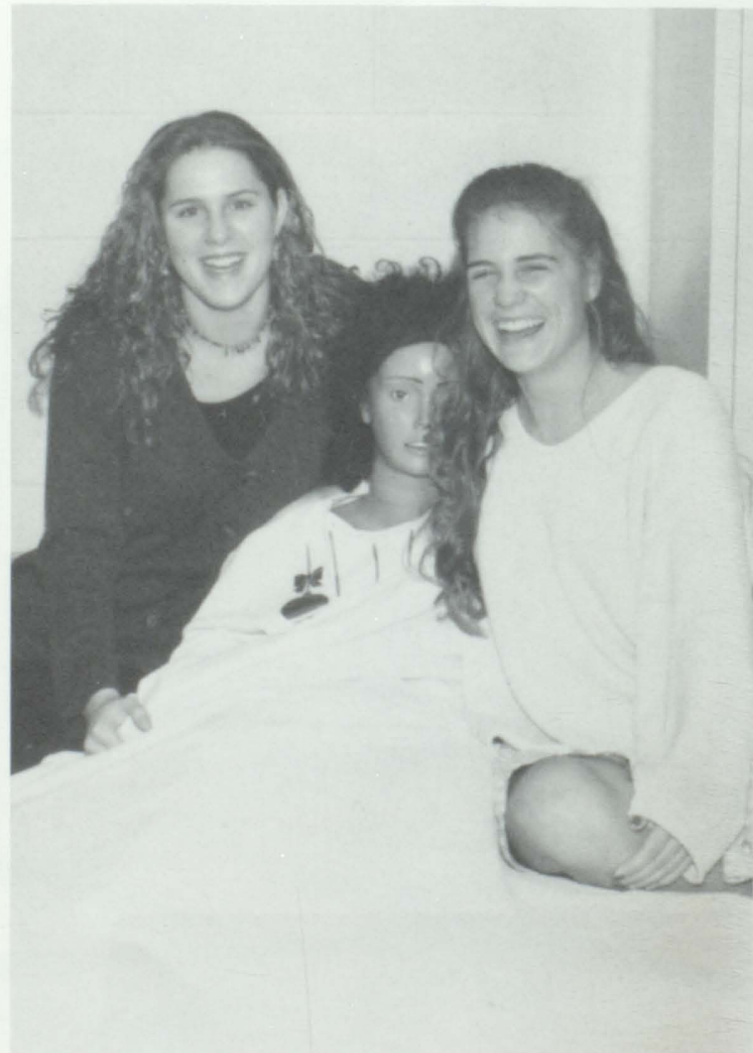

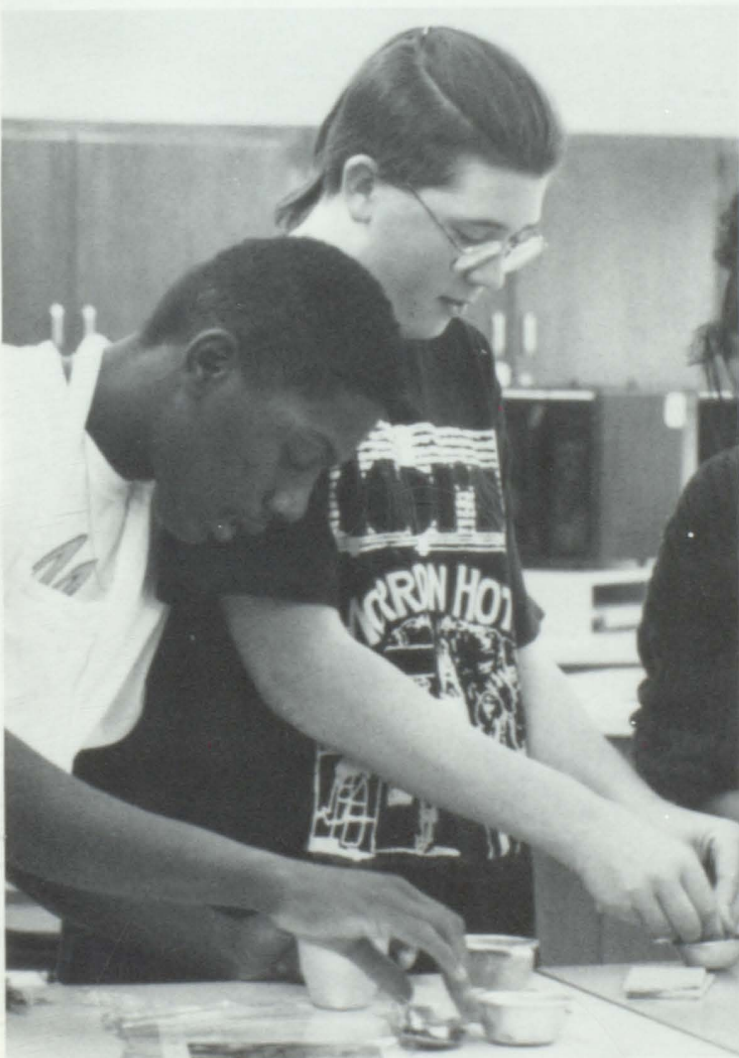
Ms. Williams, the full time life skills teacher at Kimball, felt that the classes were important because they help people deal with their roles as individuals, as

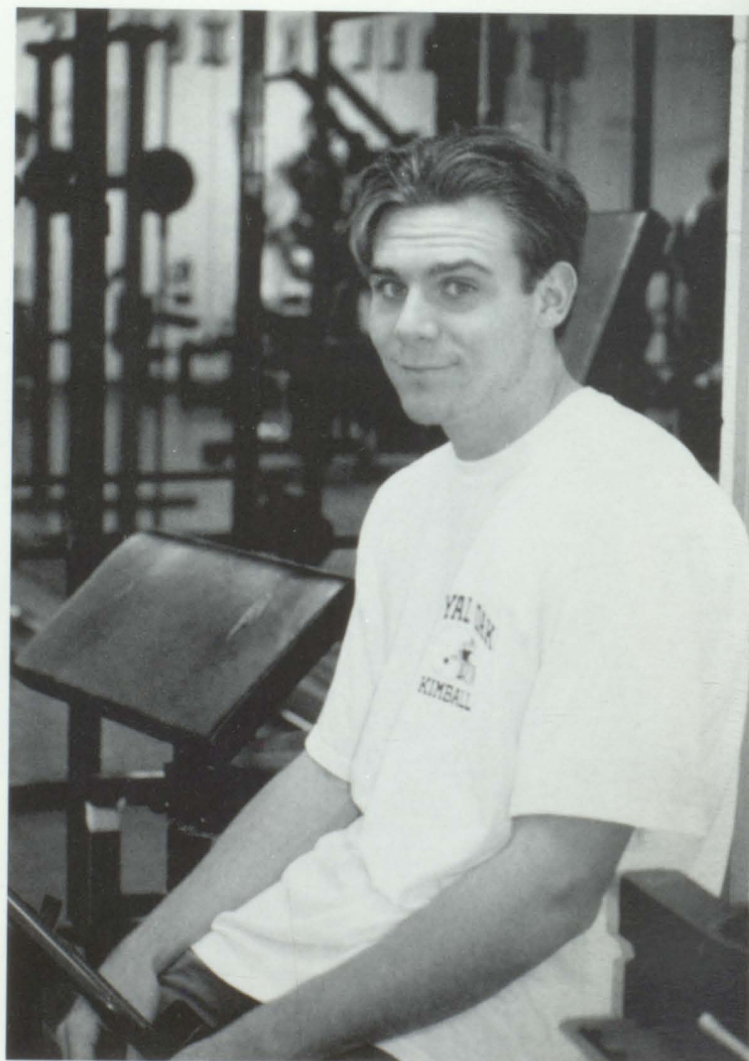

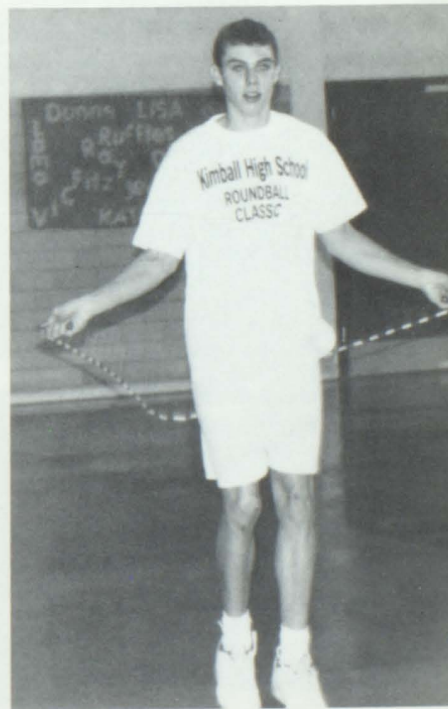

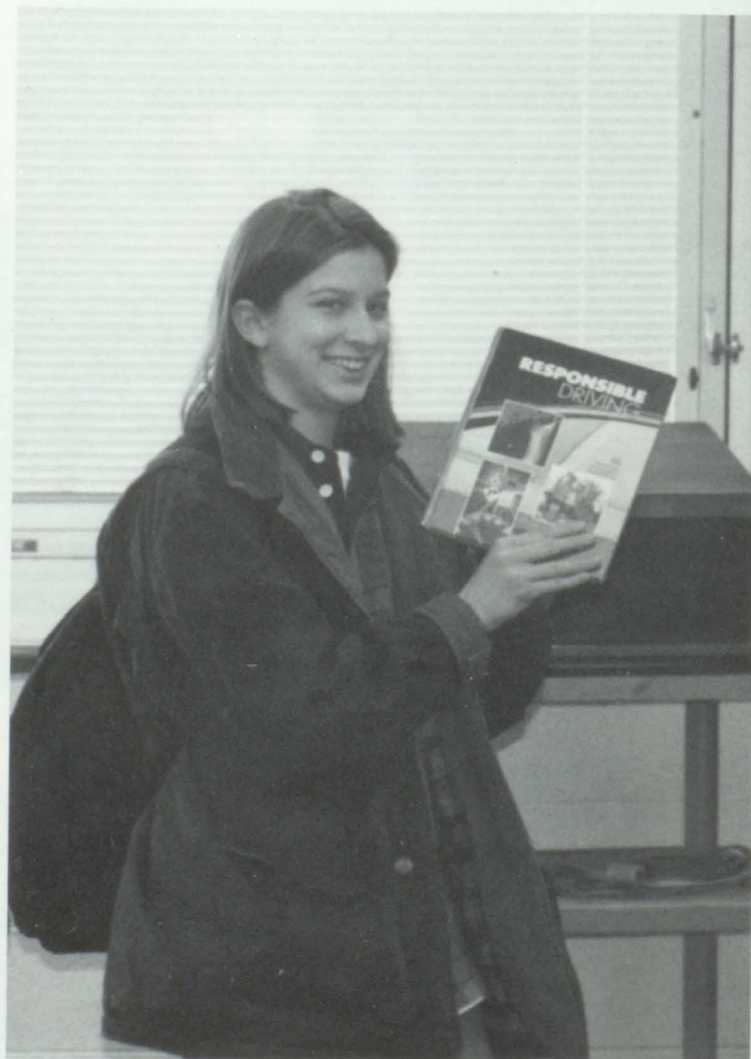

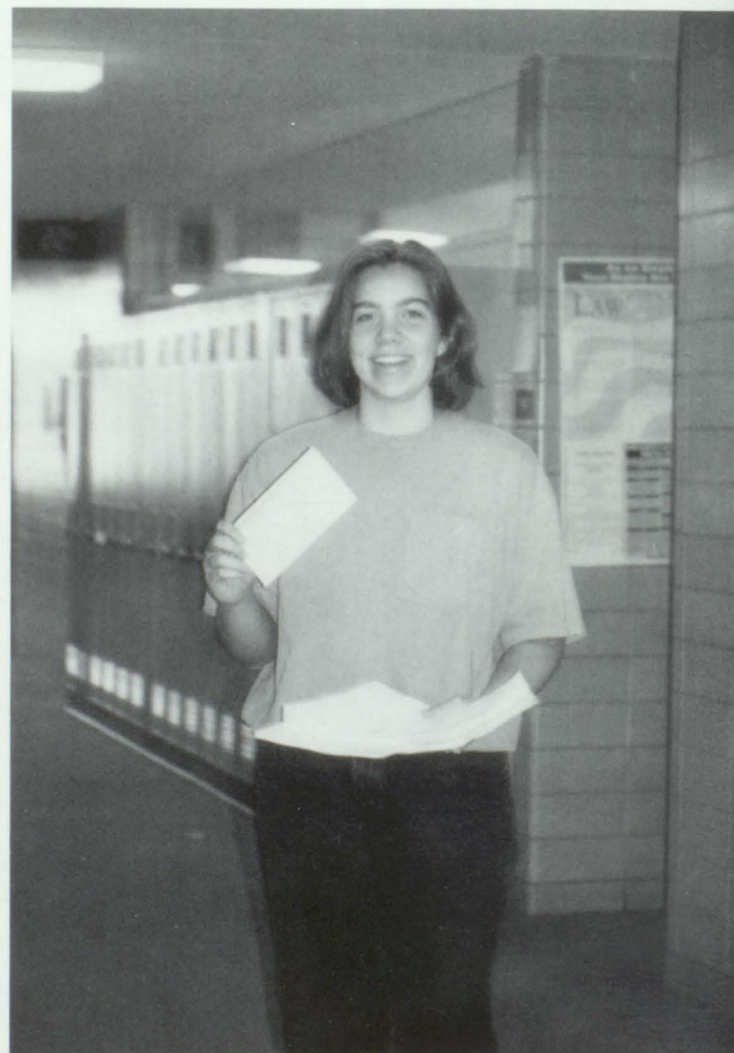

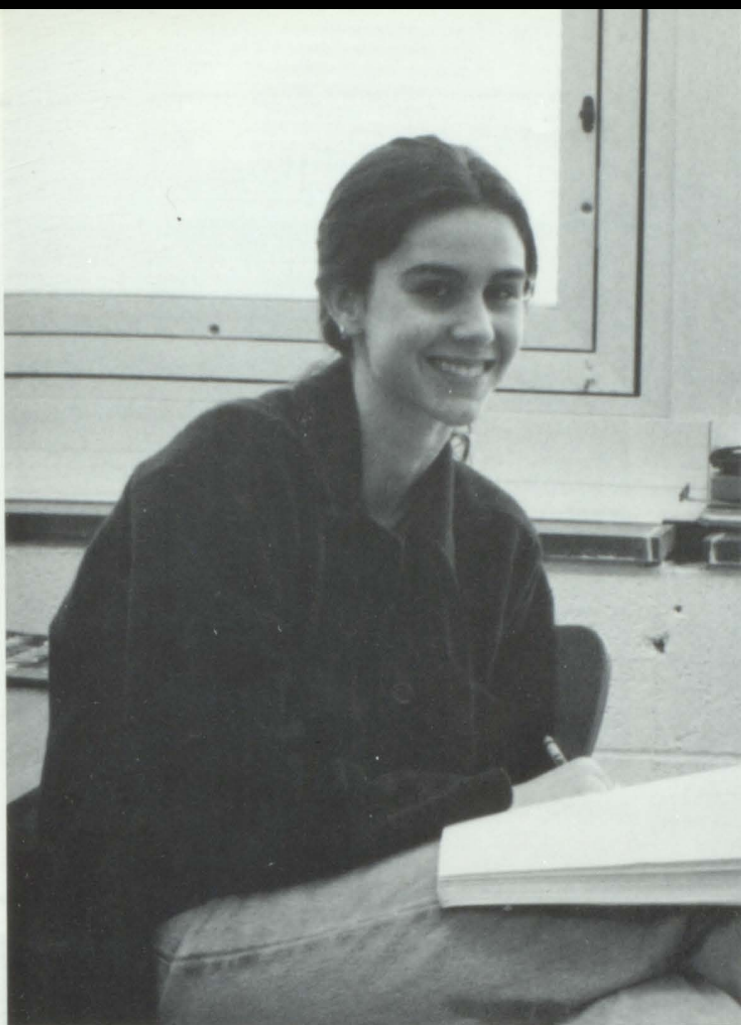

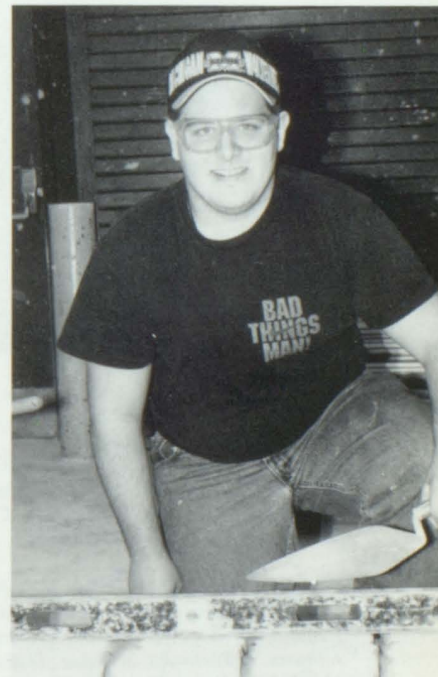

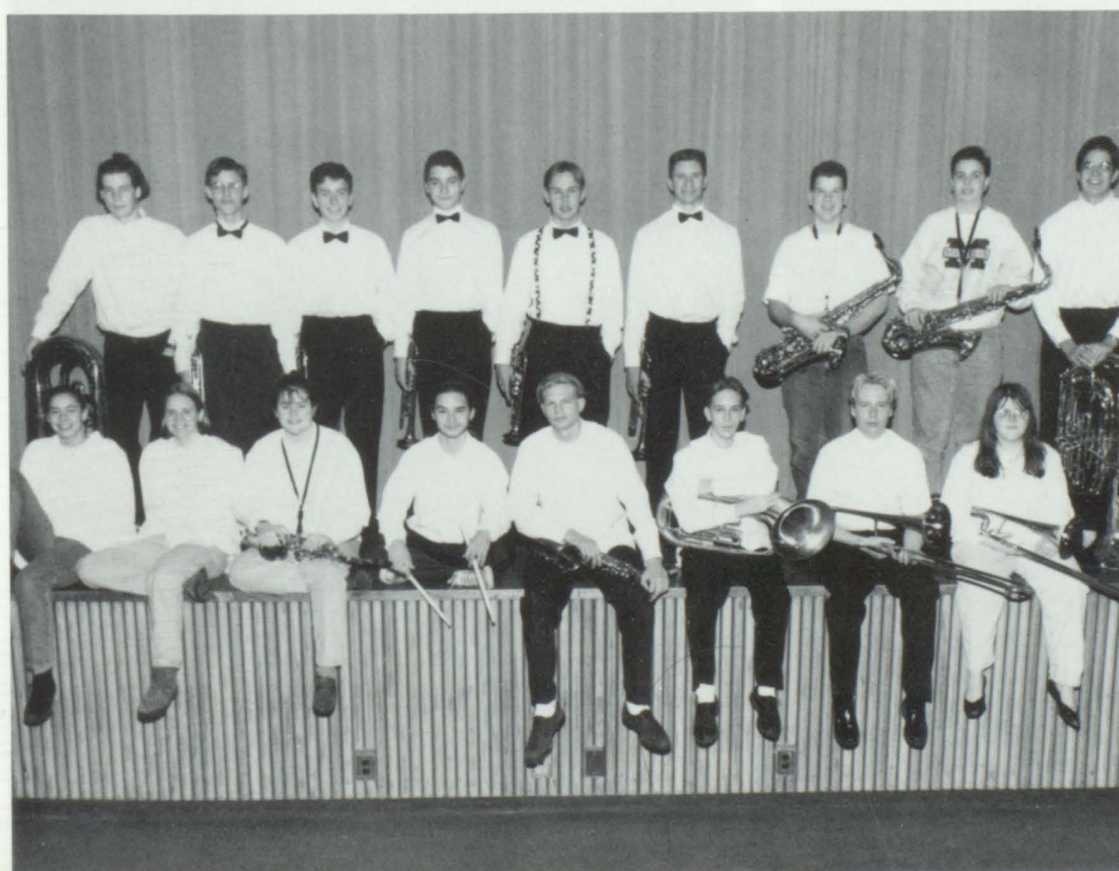

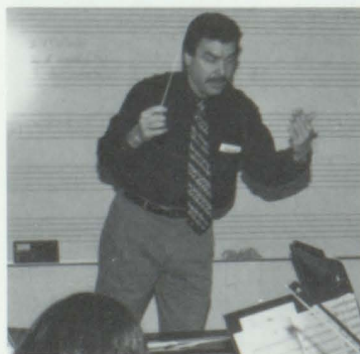

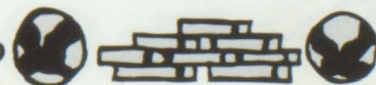

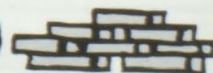

## BITS AND PIECES

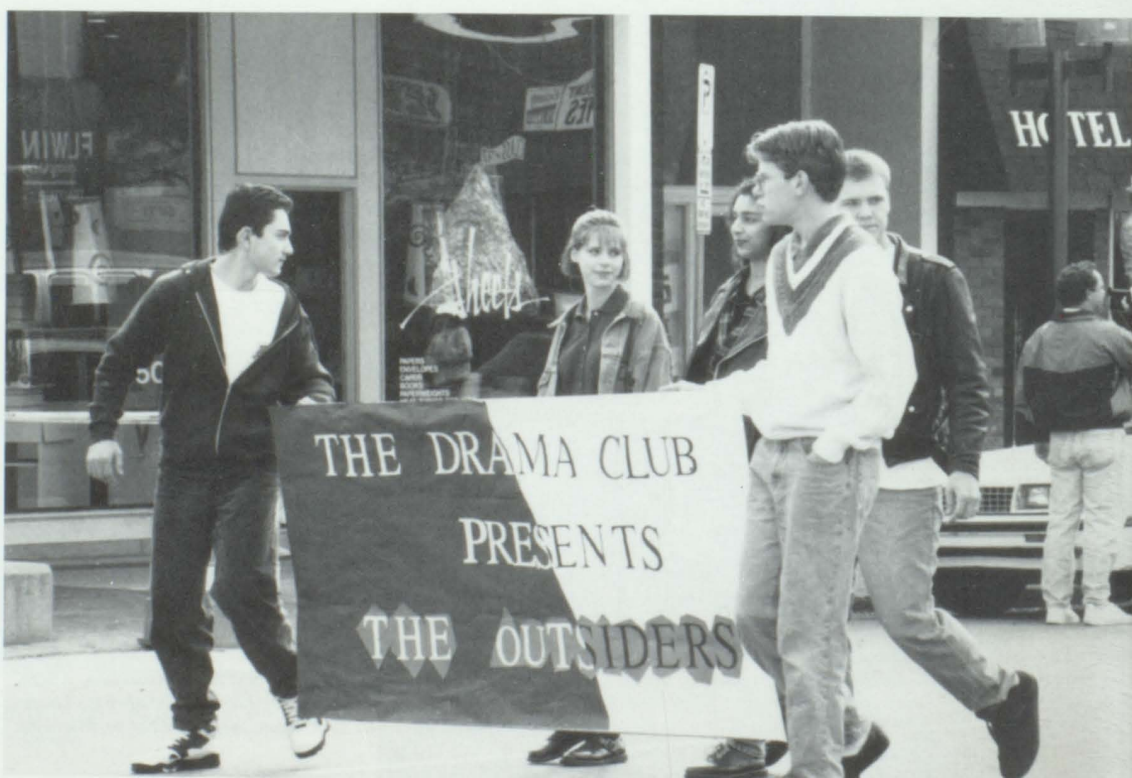

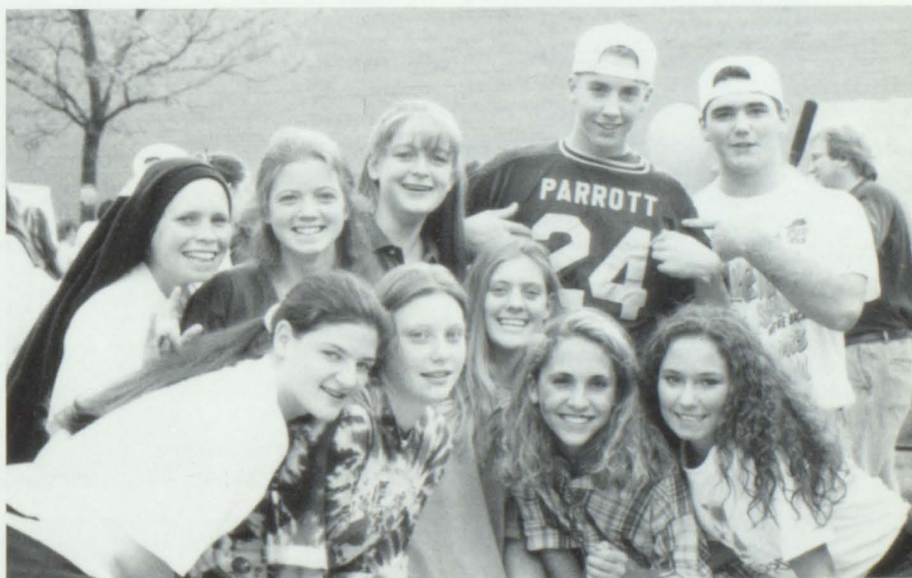

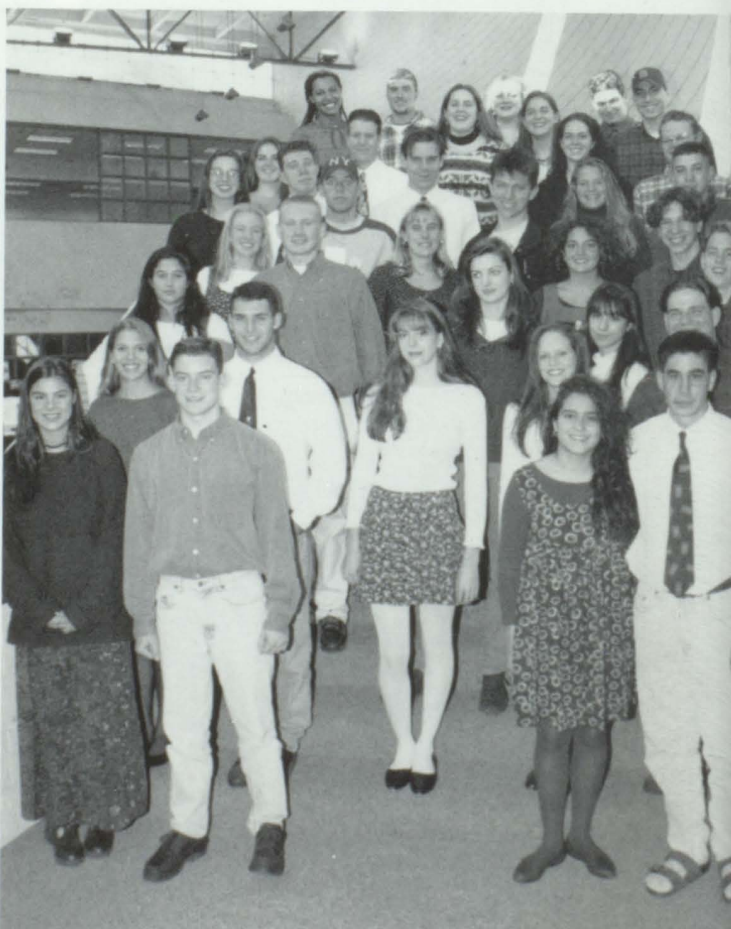

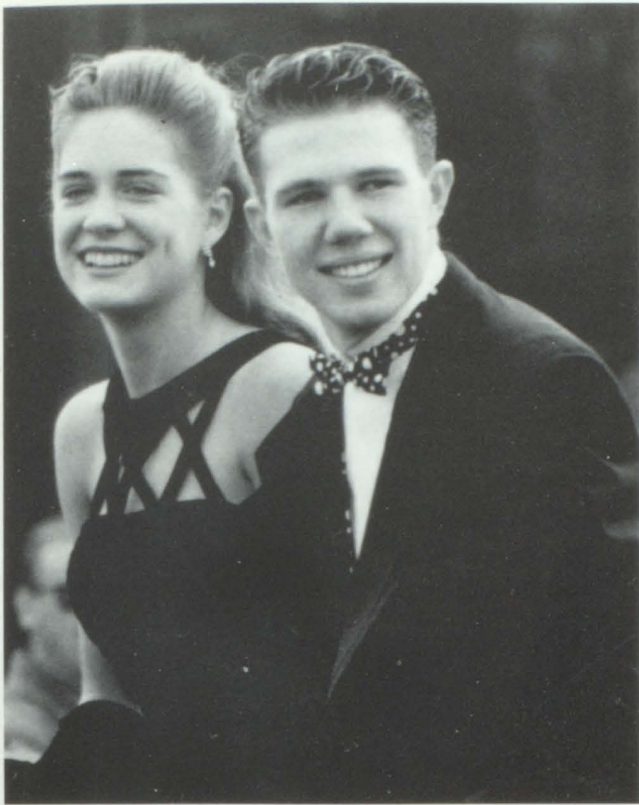

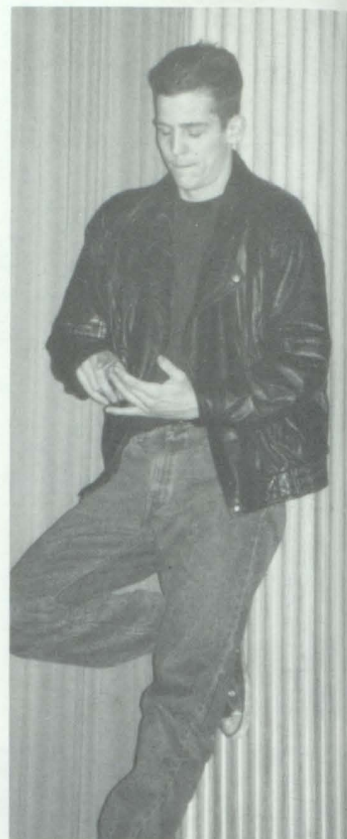
## The Curtains Open . . .

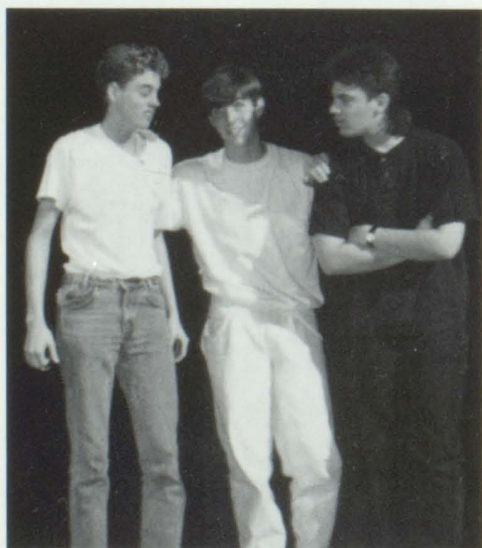

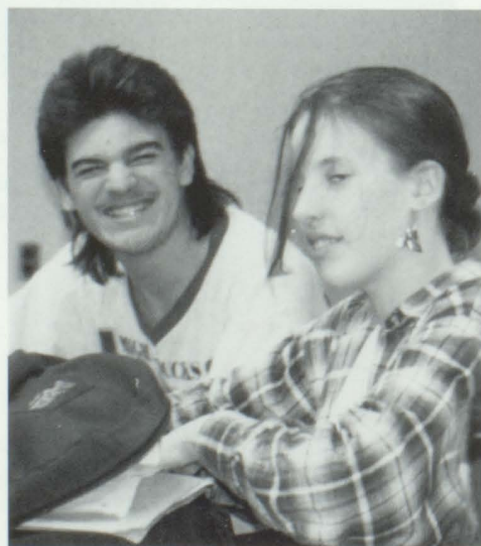

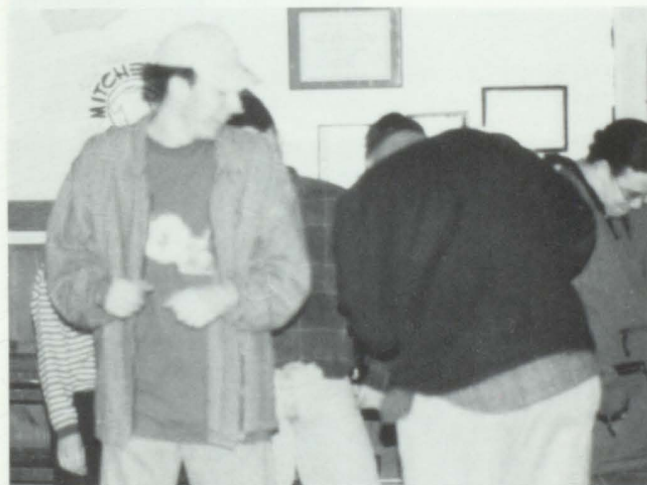

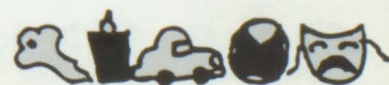

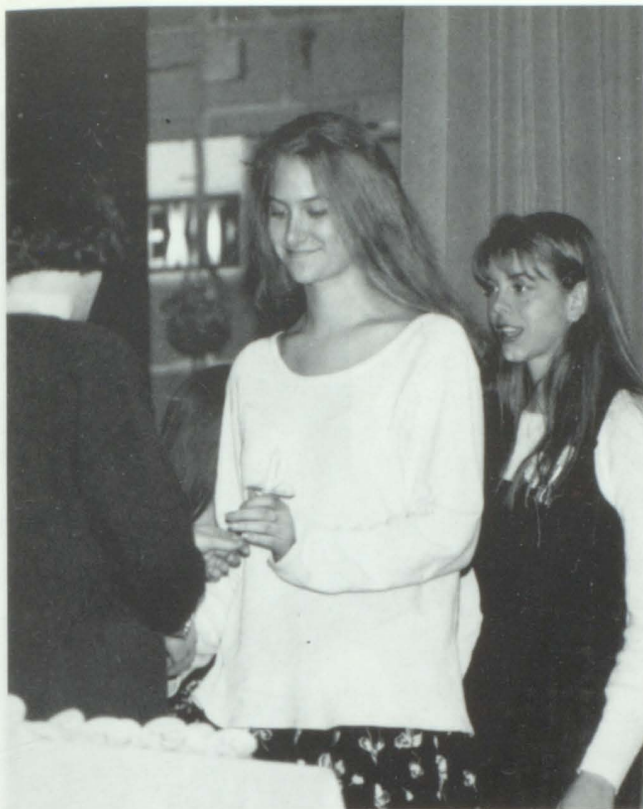

Varsity Club is always looking for new members to join in on the fun. So, if you are interested swing on by the cafeteria and see what it's all about.

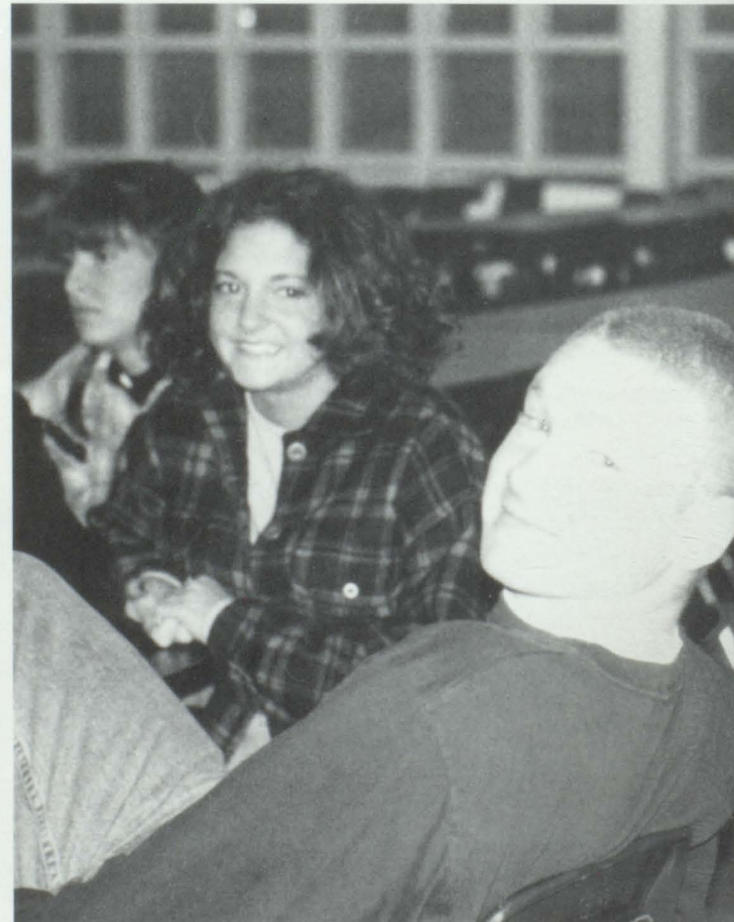

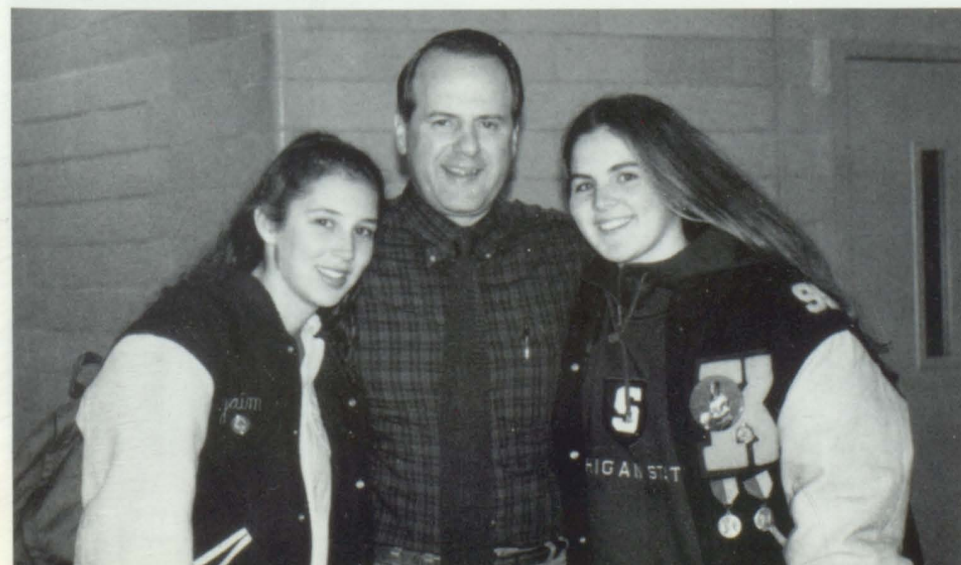

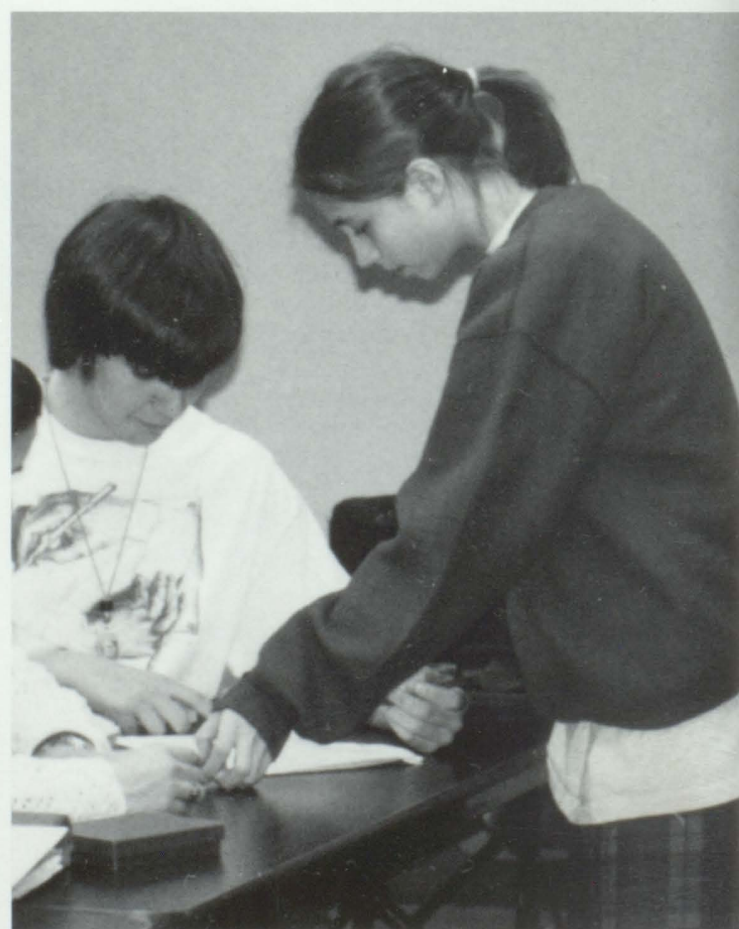

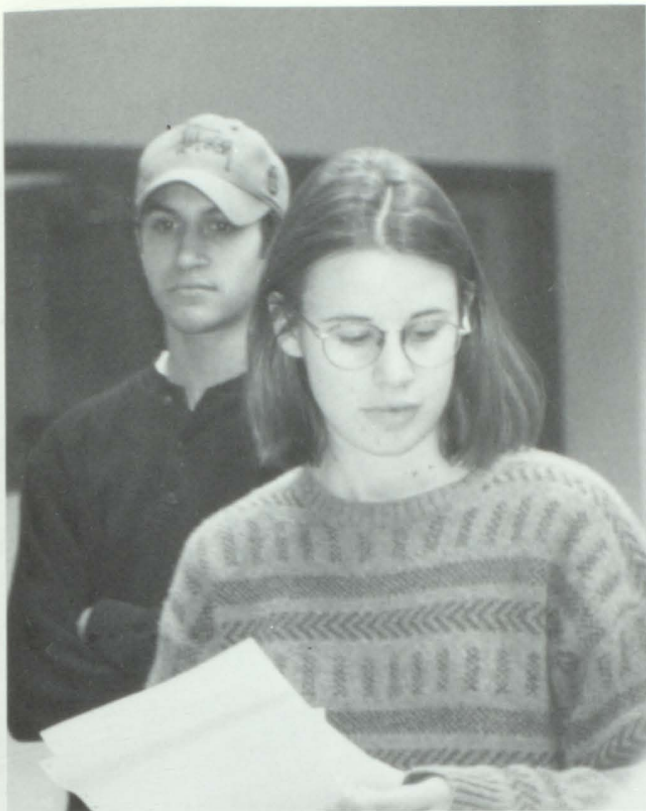

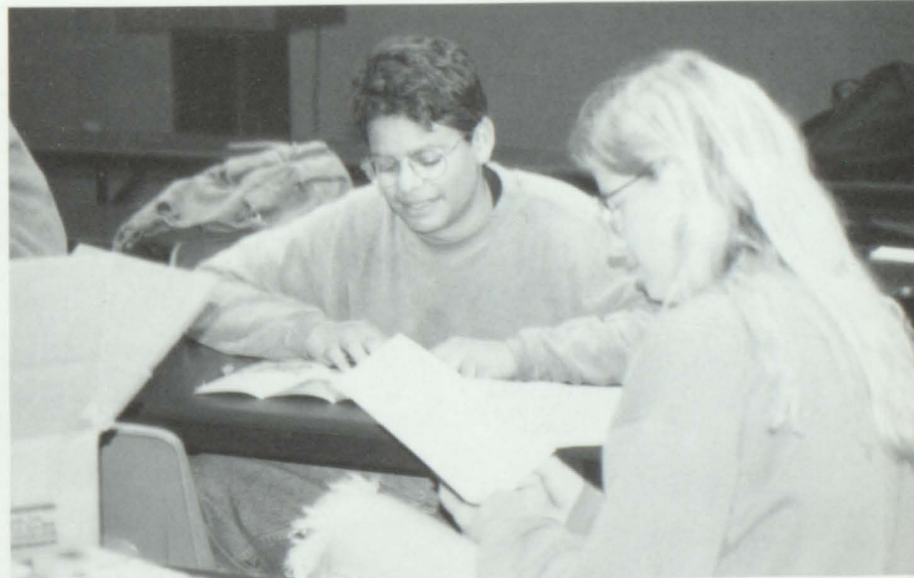

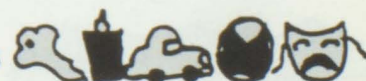

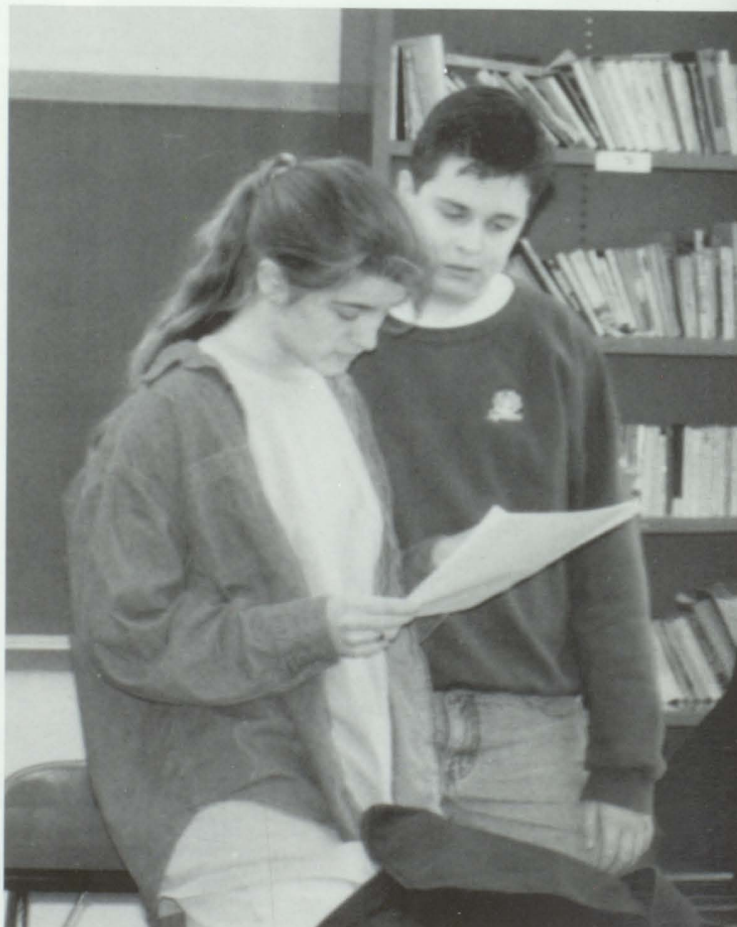

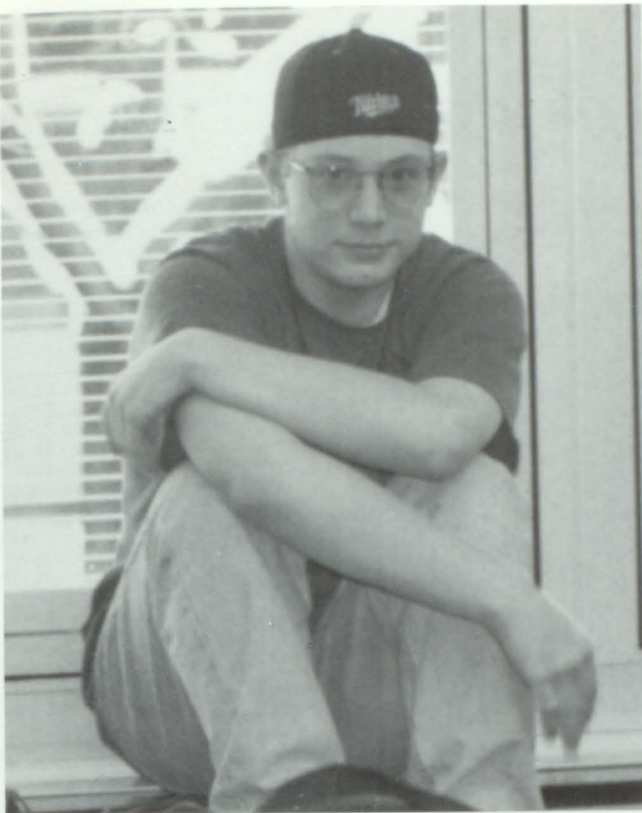

To raise money SADD sold the popular cash cards again. This year students could get discounts at Domino's, Wendy's, the Home Theater Video, among other places.

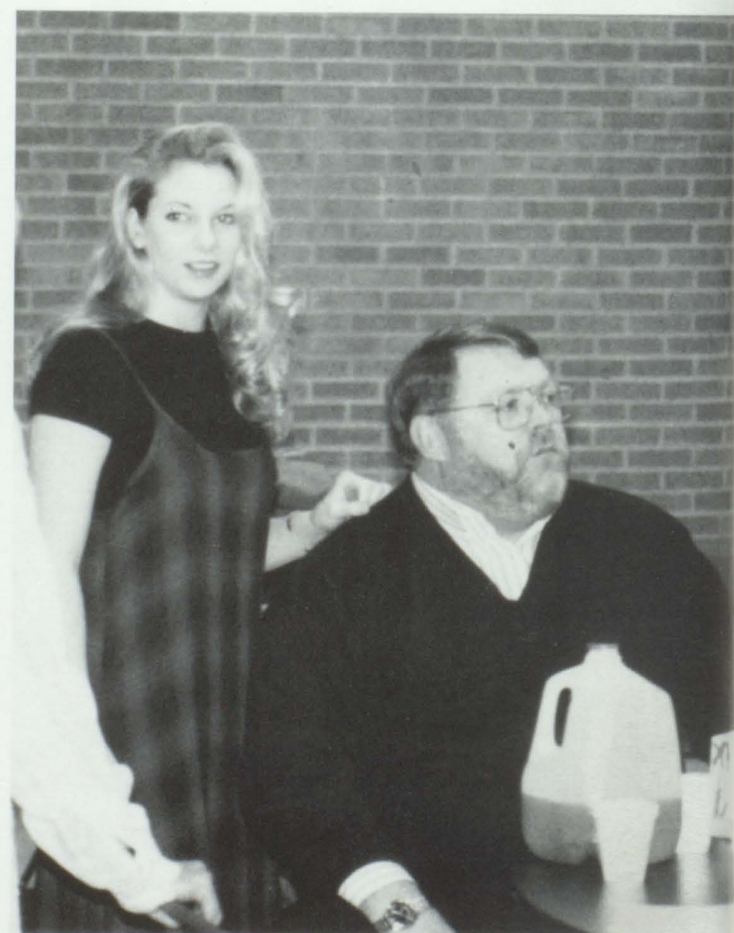
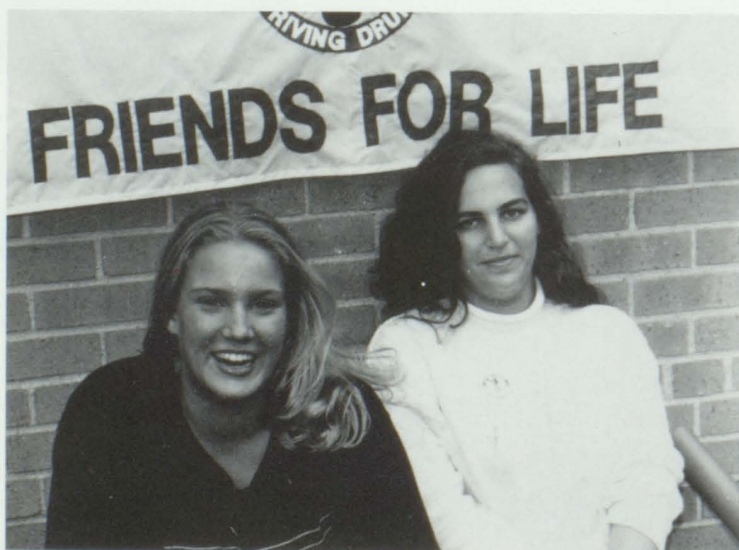

had to get the student body to give them a hand. "We had to sell candy in order to raise enough money for the Regional Conference," stated Melanie Schell.

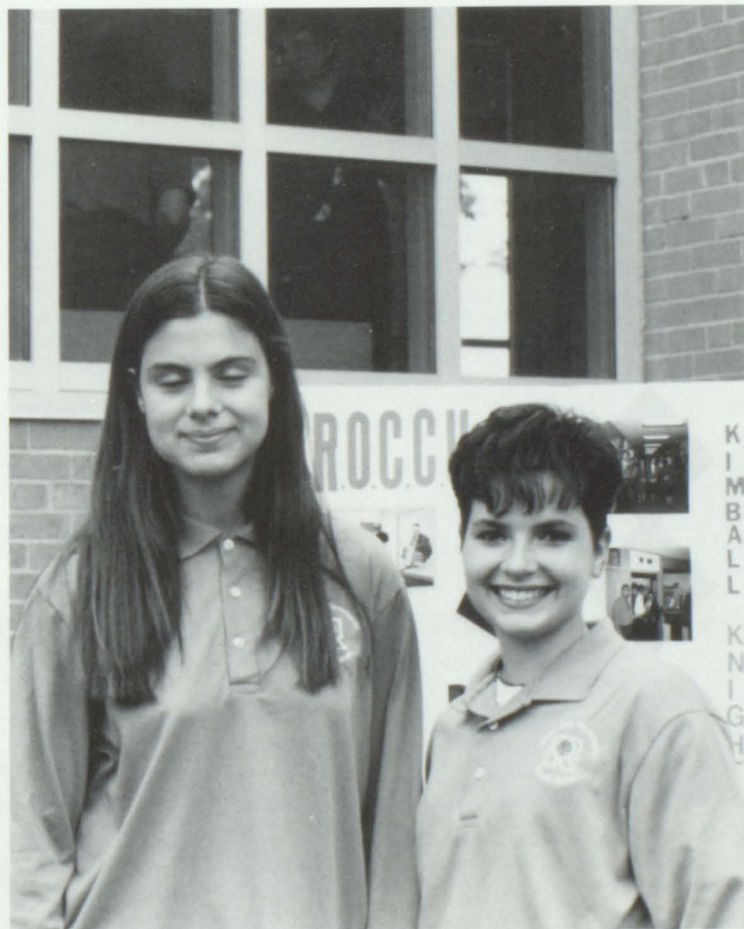

French Club is open to anyone in a French class who would like to enjoy some French culture and meet new and exciting people who also speak the language of love.

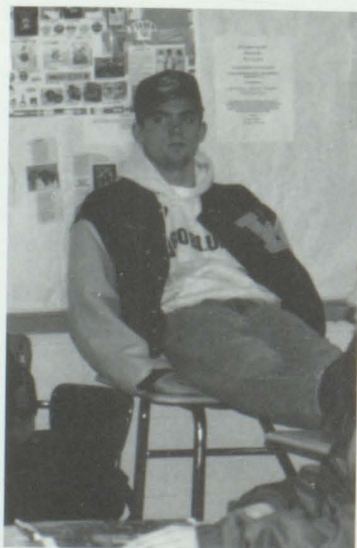

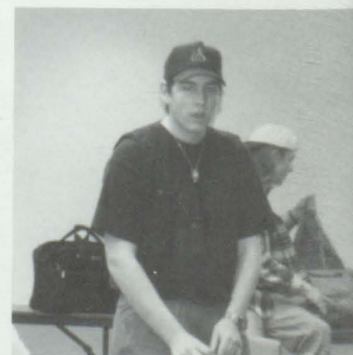

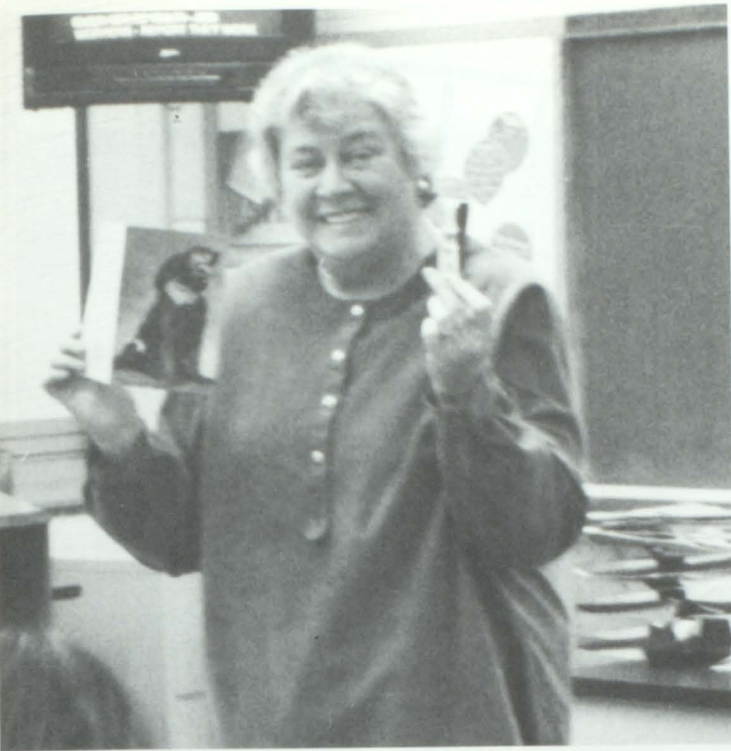

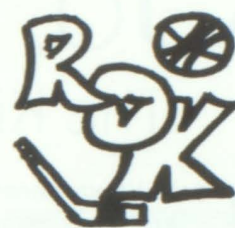

The Knights certainly did that with an 8-1 record after the conclusion of the regular season.

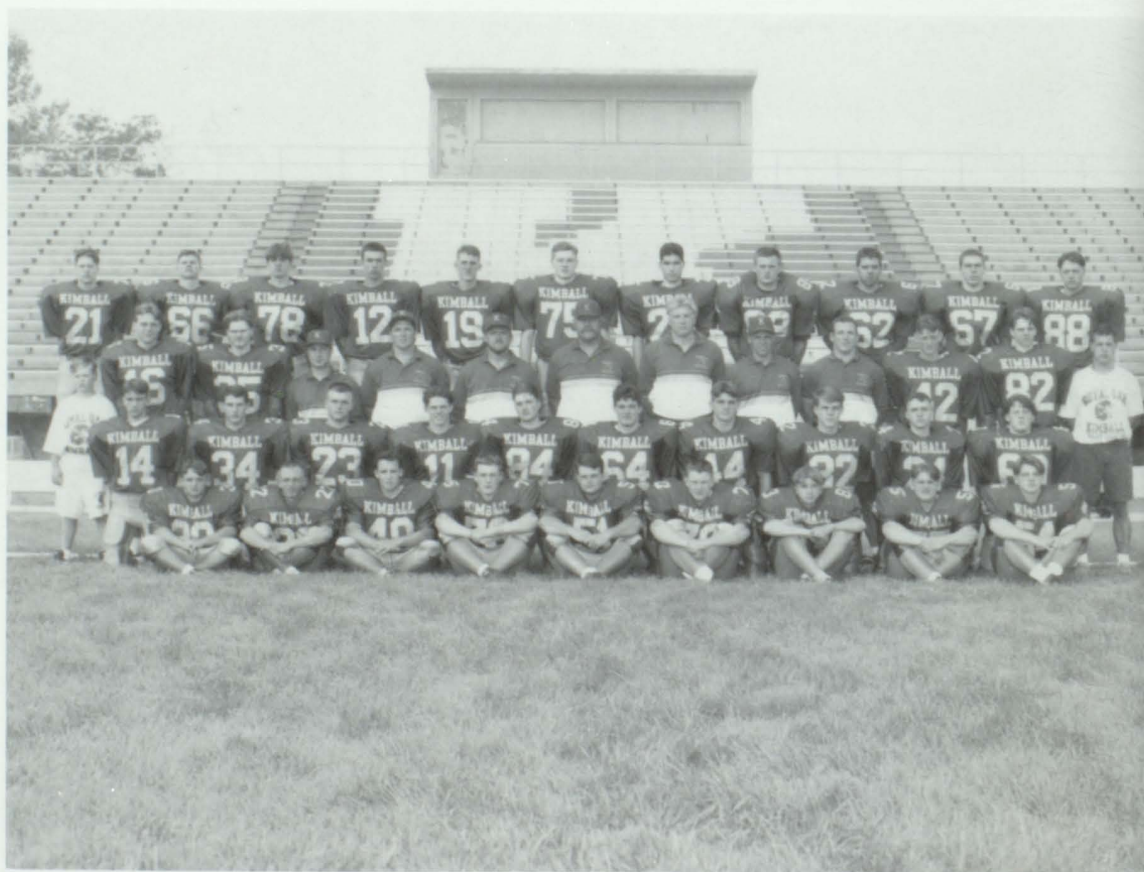

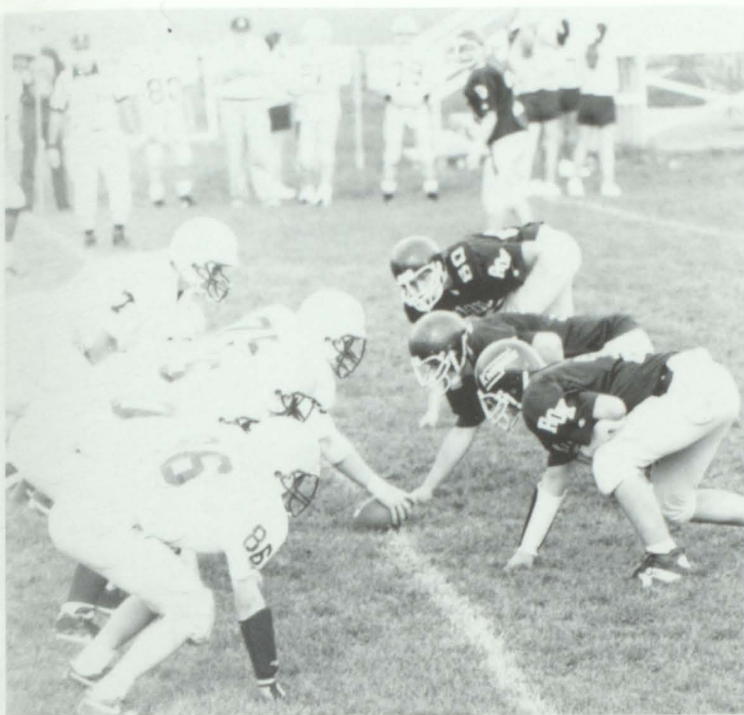

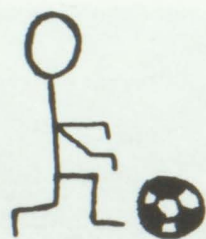

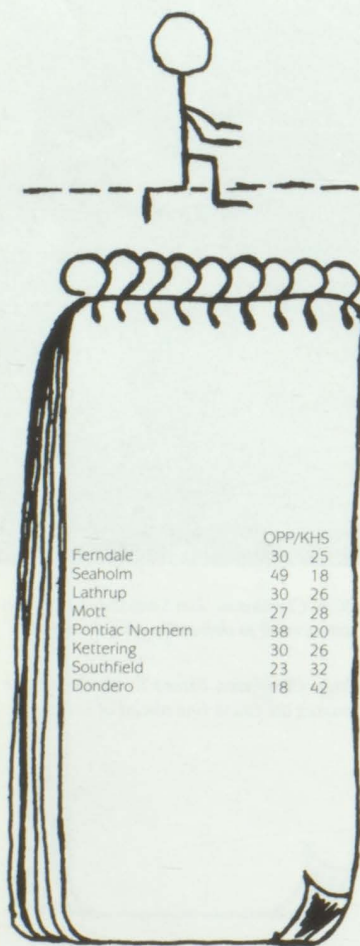

Jaclyn Sauter, Lisa Granke, Michelle Ray, Brenda Lantz, Telo Dunne, and Amy Lambert.

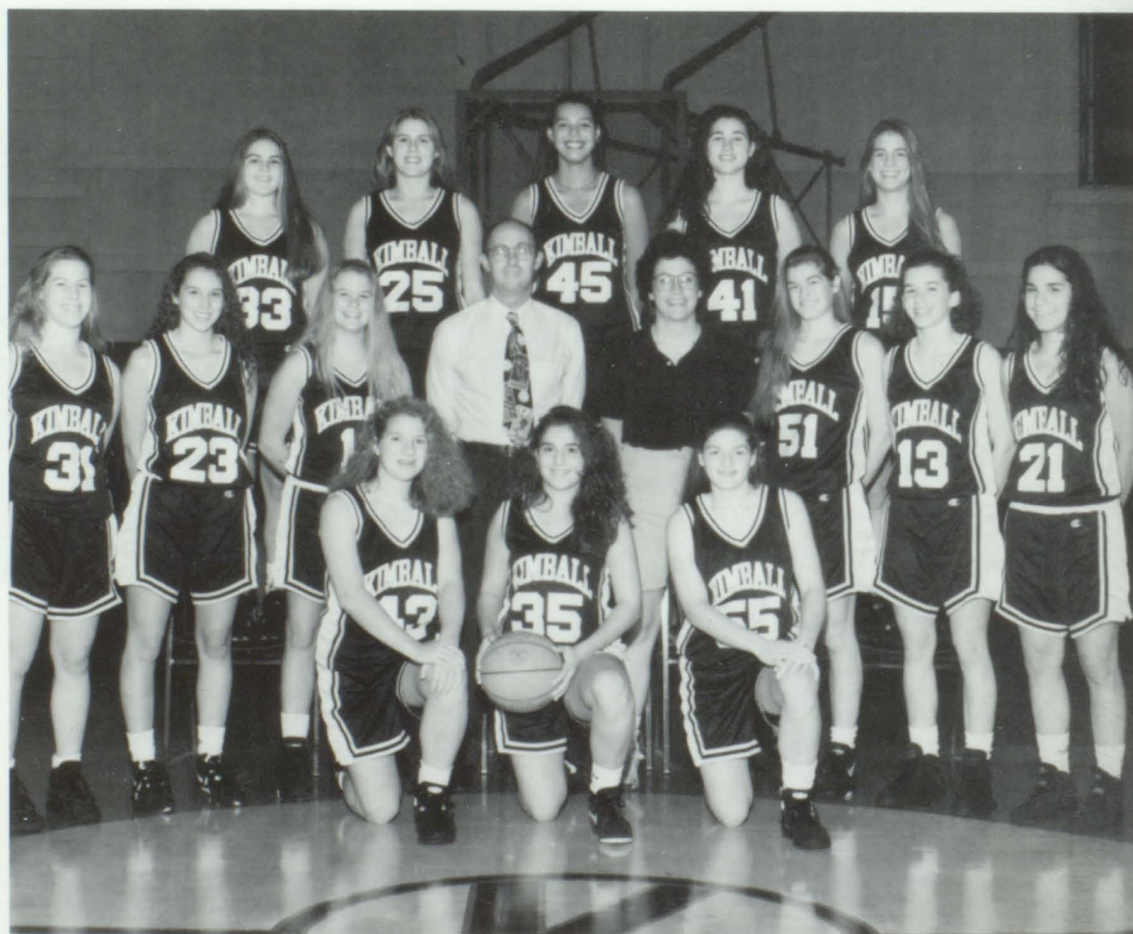

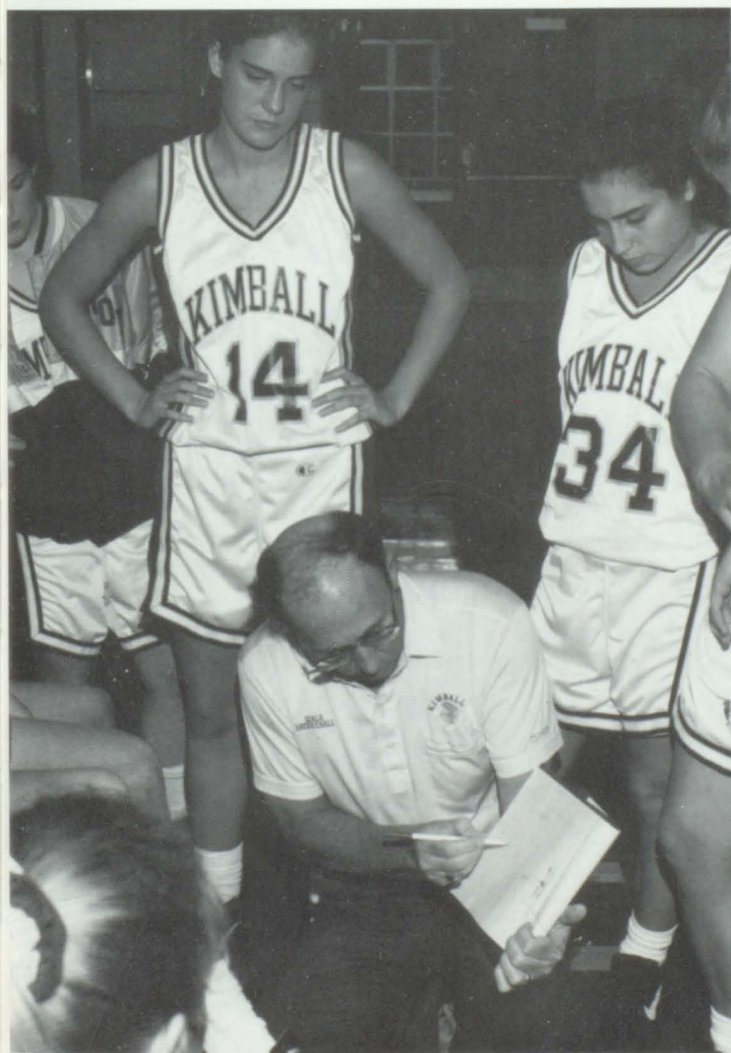

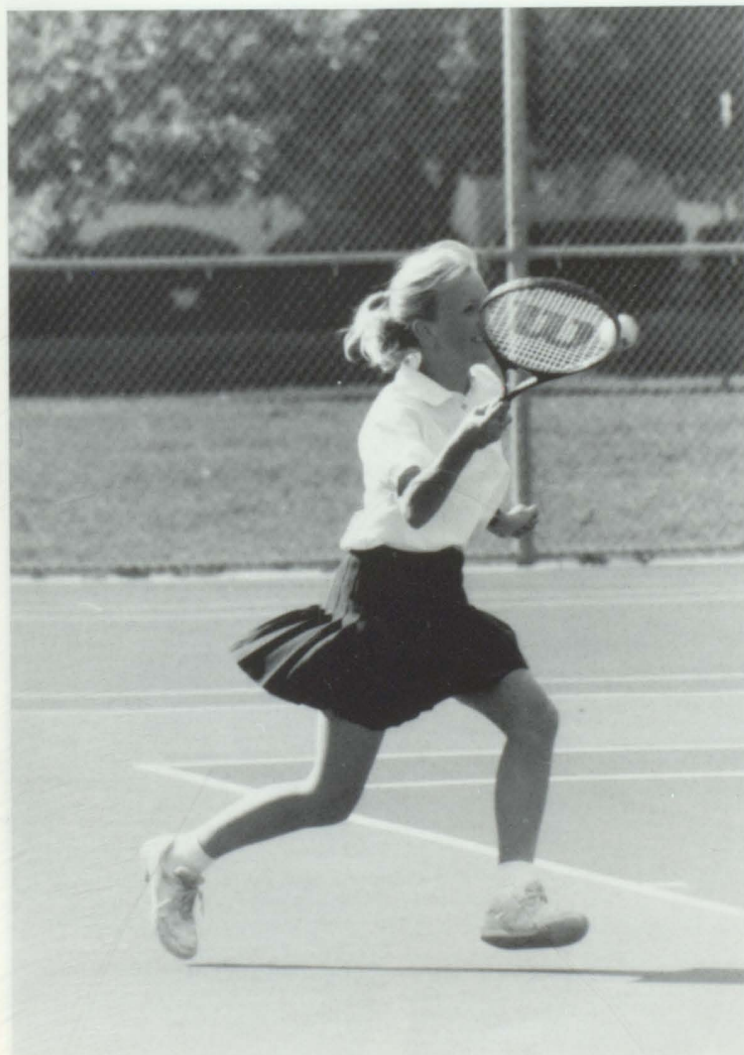

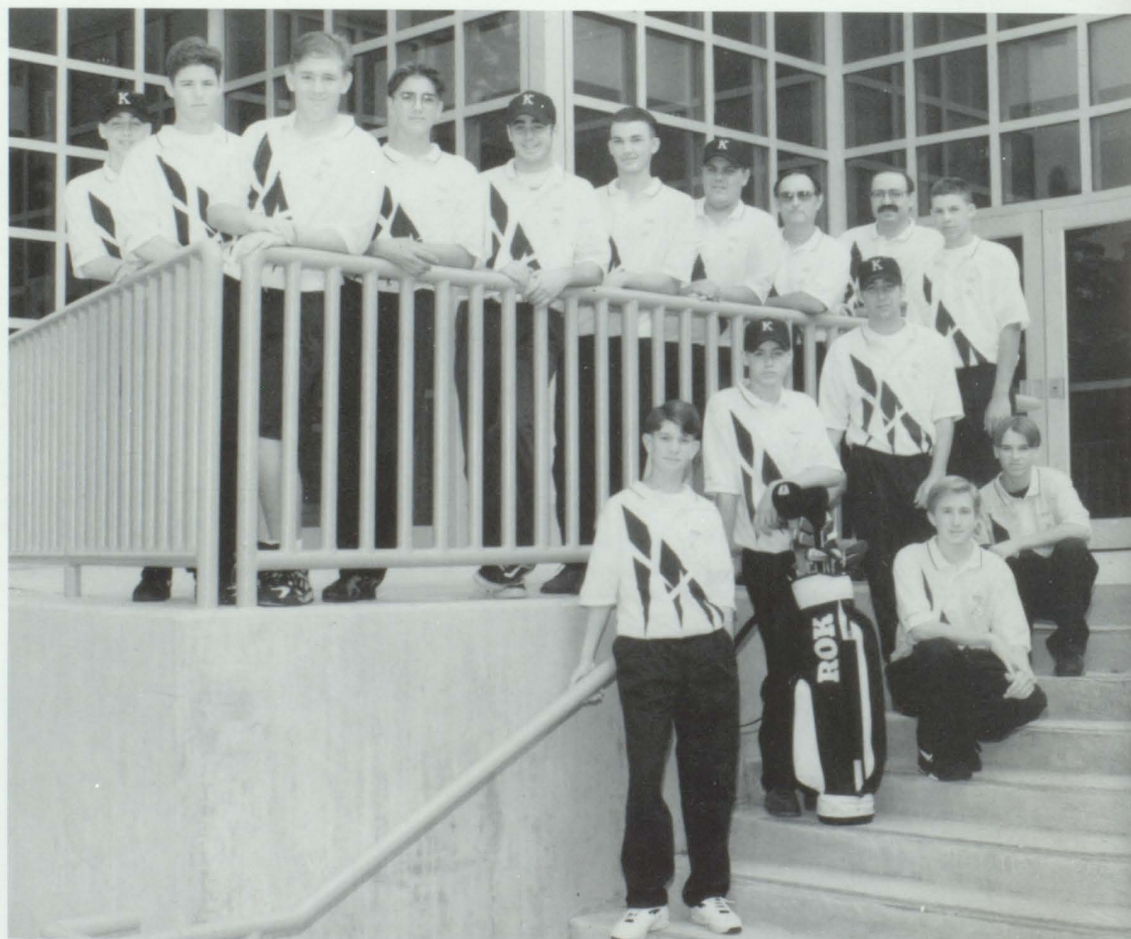

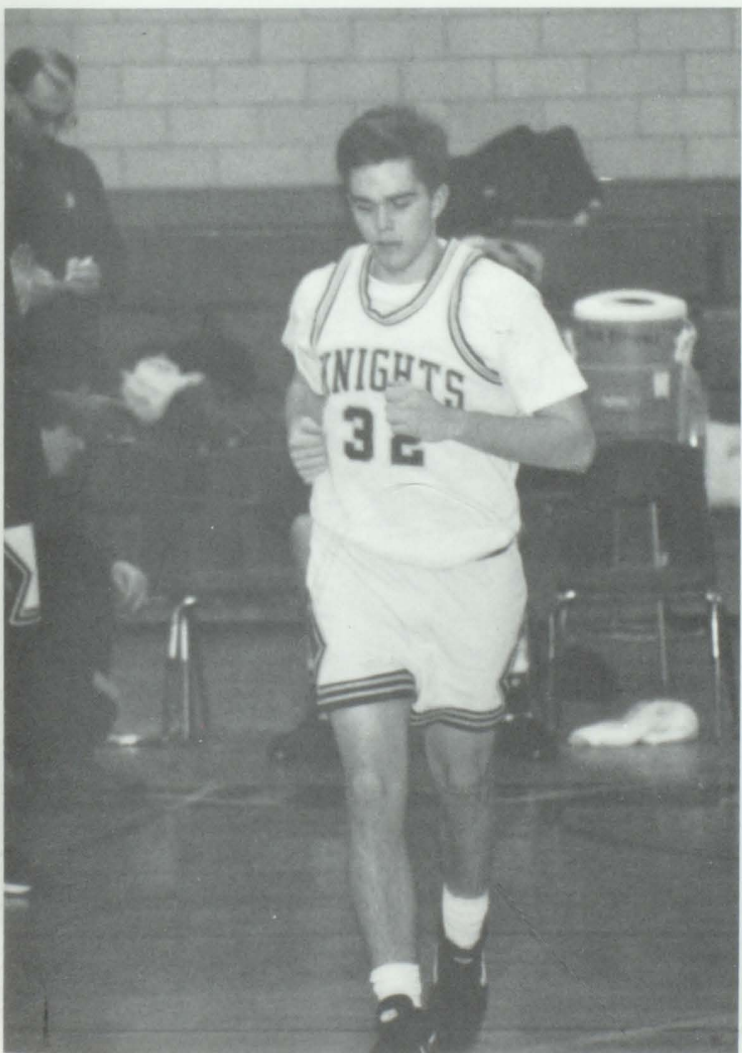

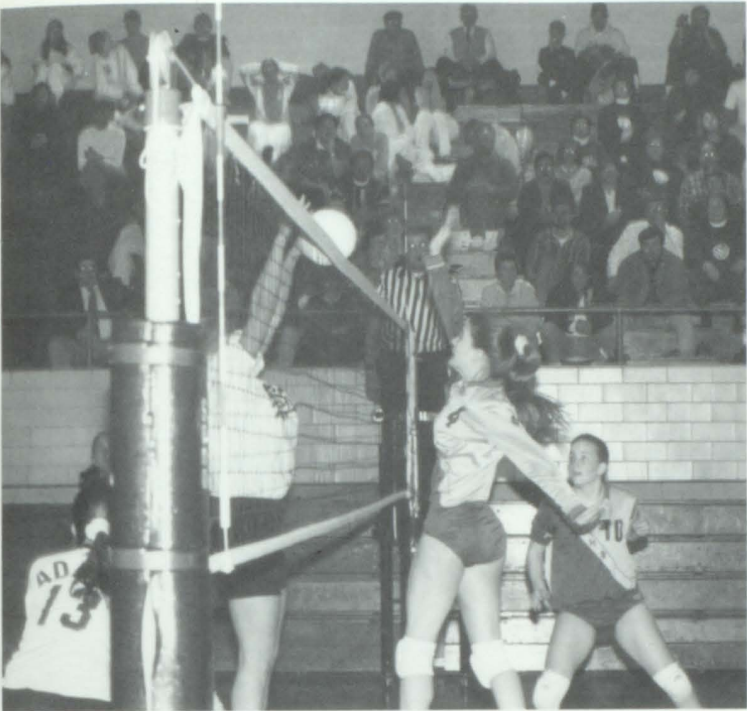

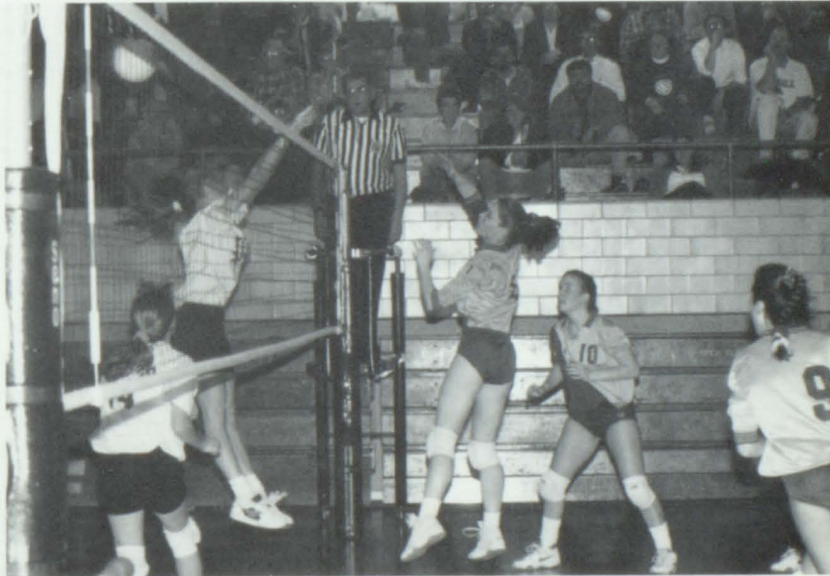
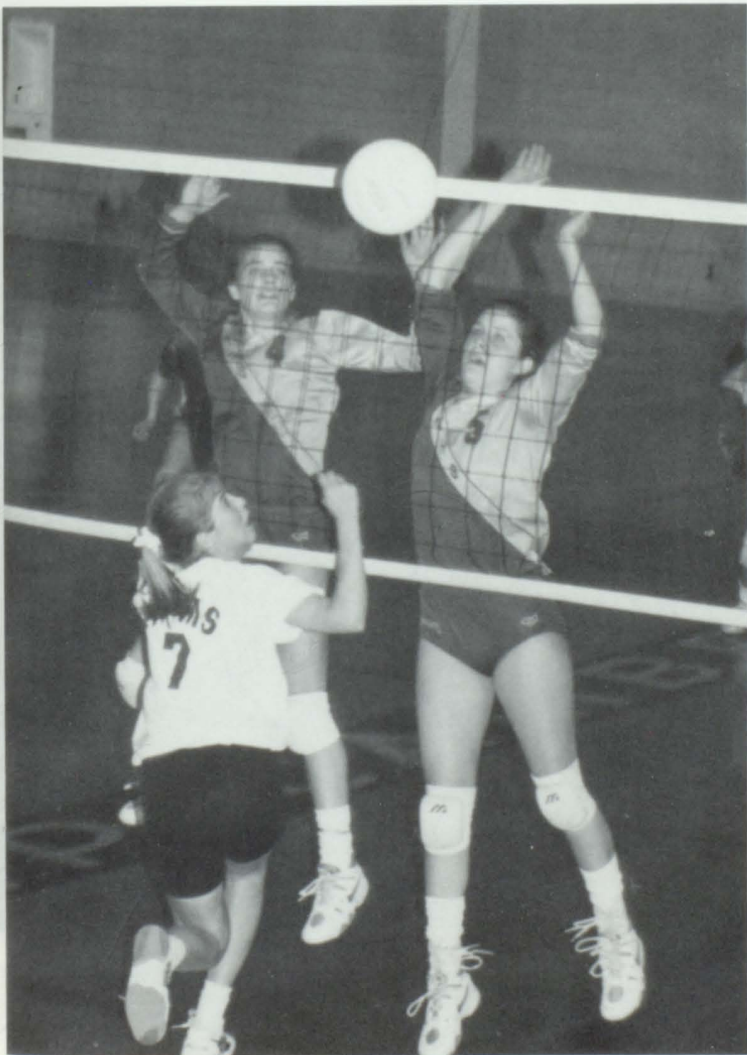

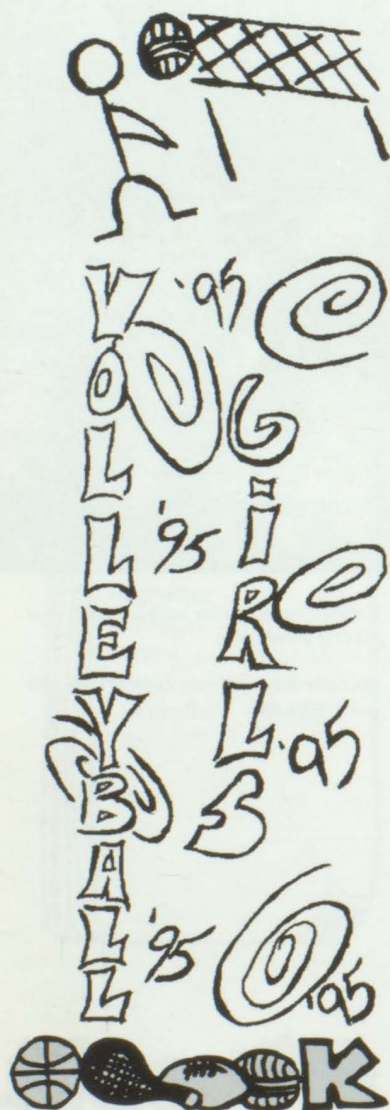

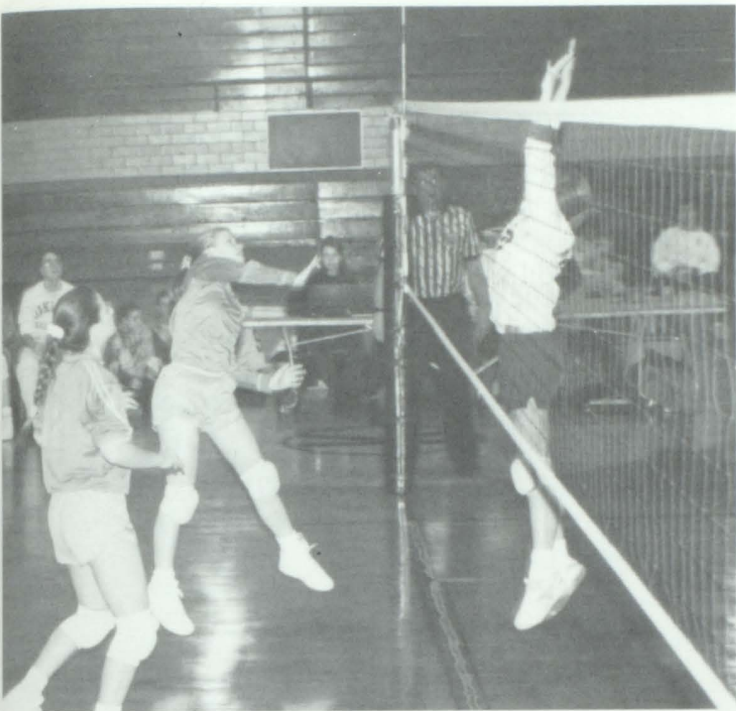

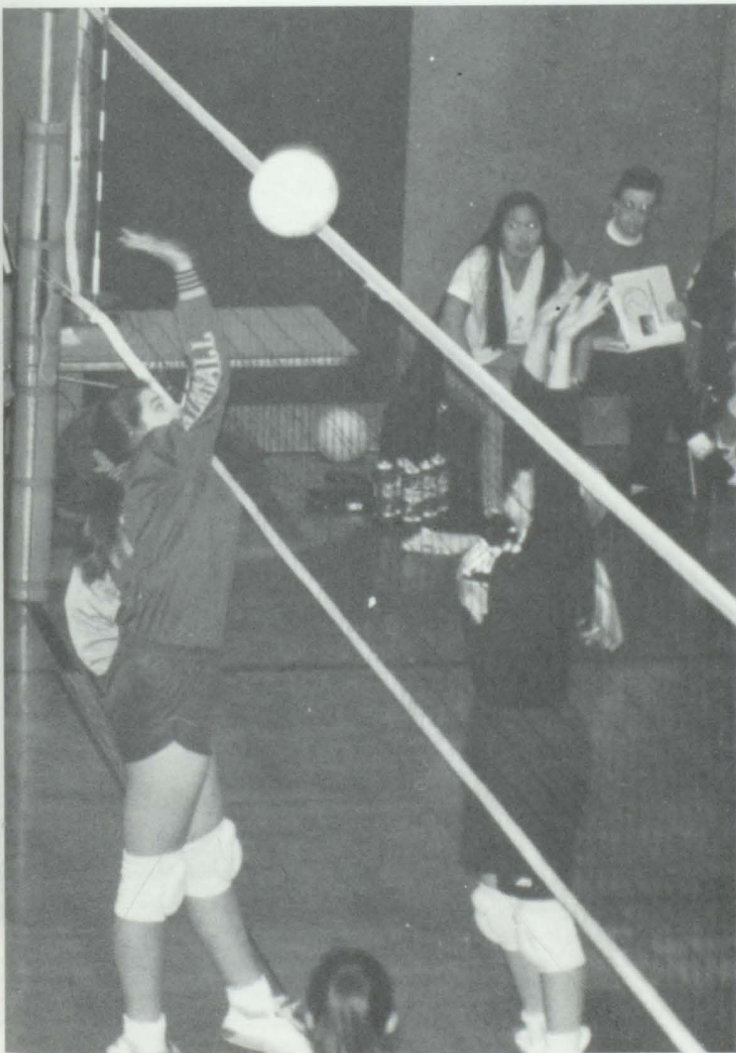

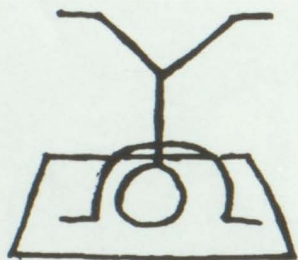

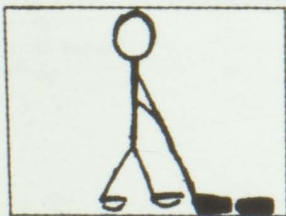
The efforts of leadership are

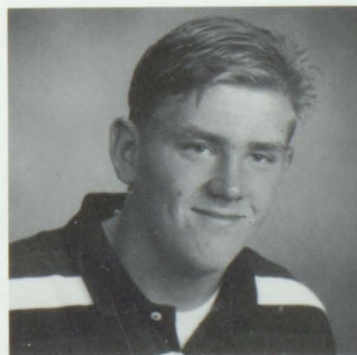

Even though the team didn't do quite as well as they would have liked to have, "We came together as a team," said Jeremy Swanson.


"I really enjoyed getting to know the rest of the guys," added Brad Shepler.

The players this year learned teamwork and competition. Sophomore Aaron Garri-

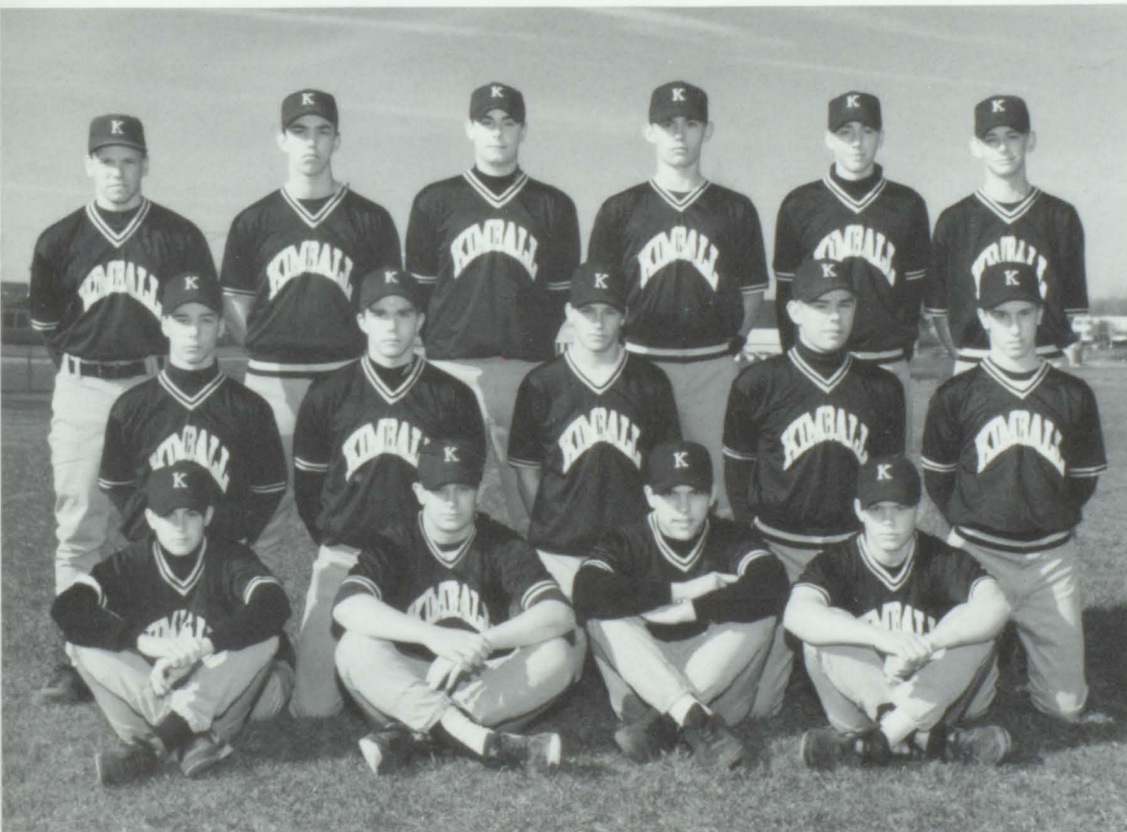

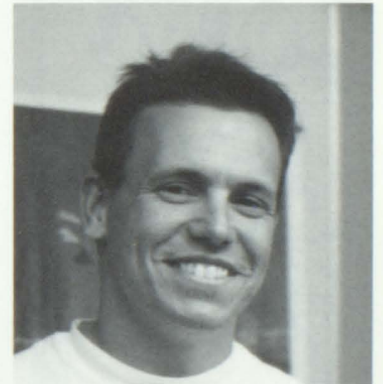

"It was really neat to see how we all worked together and pushed each other. Even though we didn't win a meet, we all met our own personal goals," commented senior Jason Webster.

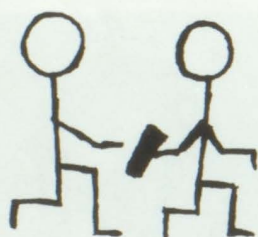

Ryan Webb, a sophomore, said that he really enjoyed the season. "I enjoyed playing all the matches." Great job tennis team!



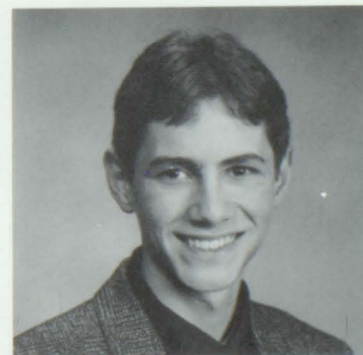

One of the loyal supporters of these Lady Knights gave the fans' point of view on watching

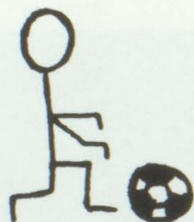
the games.

When you walk on by and you call my name.



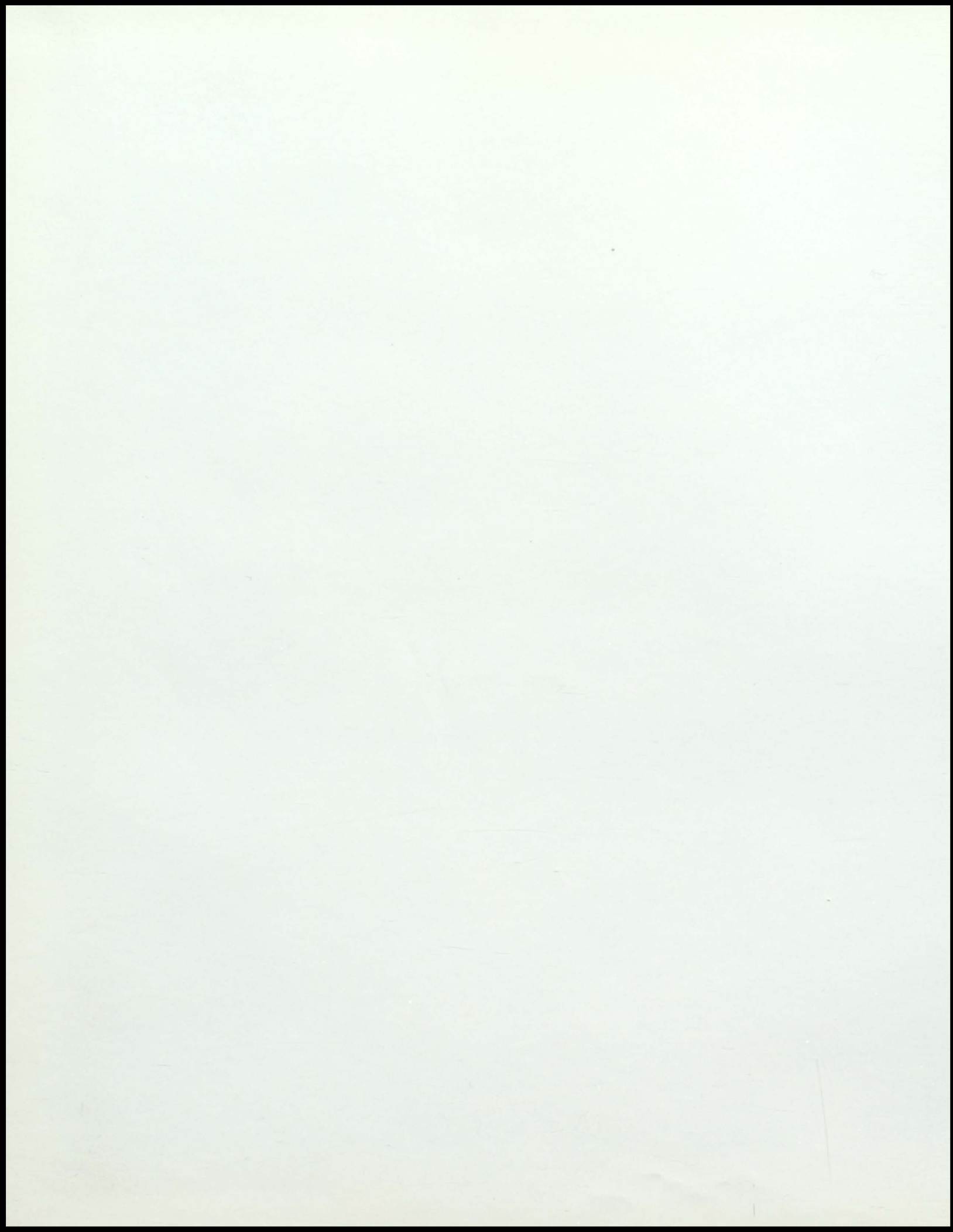




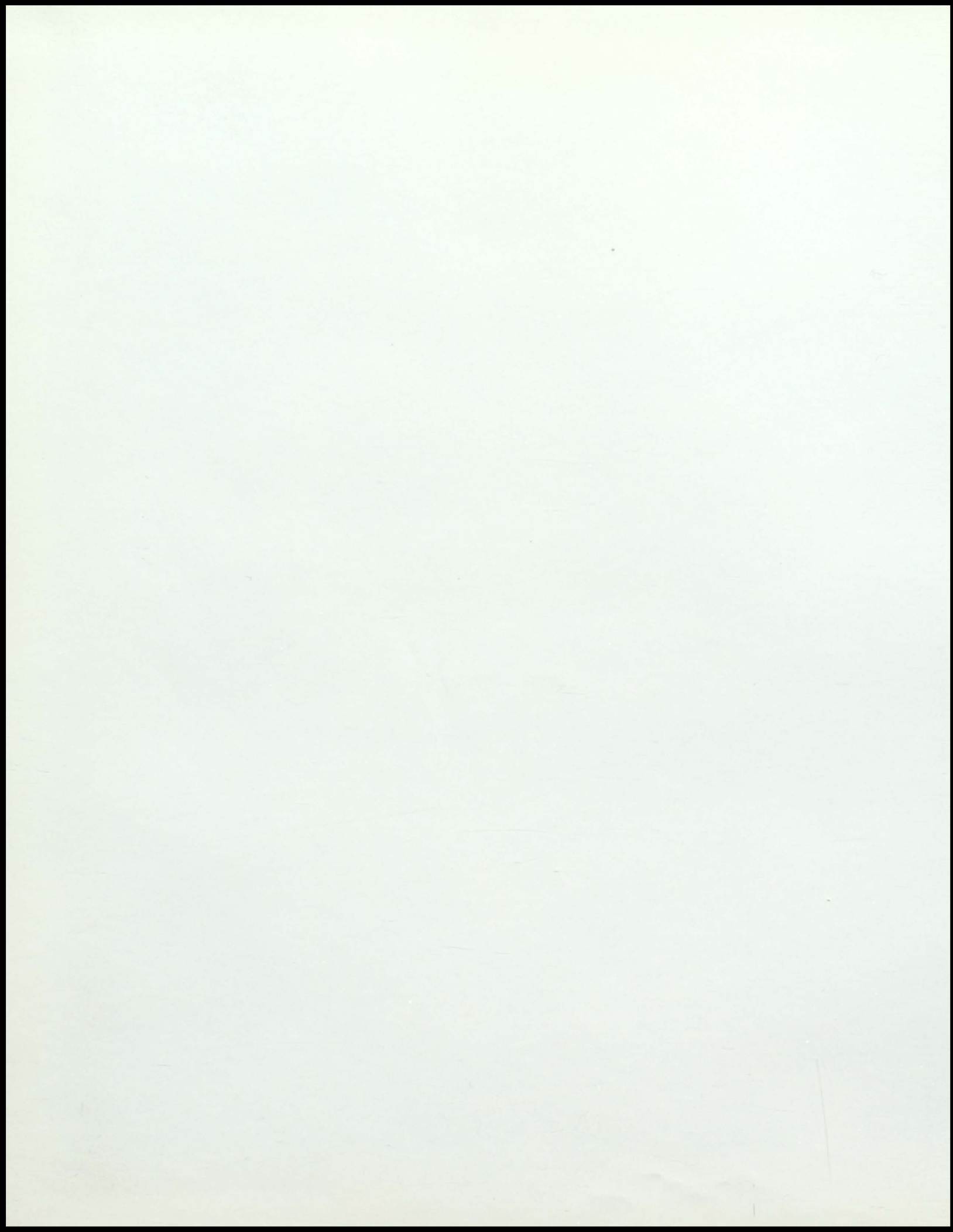
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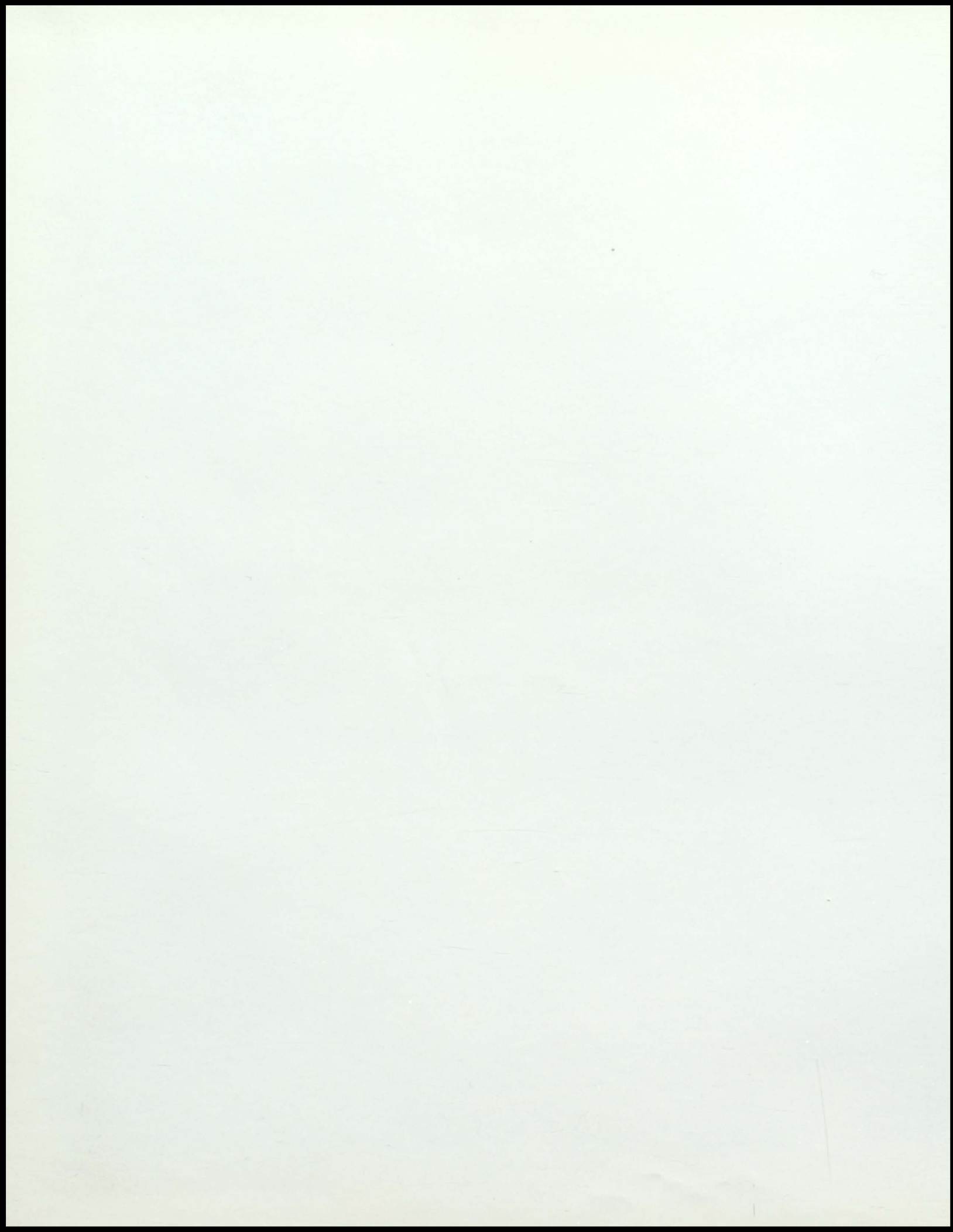
