Artist Laureate

The Royal Oak Artist Laureate program is designed to recognize and acknowledge the artistic contributions of experienced individual artists, to provide a year of exposure for the selected artist to share their talent with the community, and to encourage and nurture the arts and creative culture in the city. The appointment of the Artist Laureate is considered a civic appointment and one of honor. Applicants must be a current resident of Royal Oak, an experienced artist, and may be from any artistic discipline. Each Artist Laureate has a specific project pre-approved by the Commission for the Arts that they will complete by the end of the year-long appointment.

This year's Artist Laureate is long-time Royal Oak resident and poet, Roberta Brown. She is committed to the arts in many ways, such as through her writing and participation in the Royal Oak Symphony Orchestra. Ms. Brown has a degree in Psychology and Music Therapy from Wayne State University as well as a Master of Arts in Public Administration with a specialization in mental health administration. Ms. Brown's project, Poetry in Public Places, will feature poetry writing workshops and readings for the community. Attendees will have the option to submit their work to be included in a published book of poems that will be developed over the next year. The book will be made available through the library and other community spaces upon completion.



Art Explored

The Art Explored Program allows community members to submit original artwork. Once submitted, the Commission for the Arts undergoes a selection process to decide which pieces will be publicly displayed in Royal Oak. This is a unique program that enables the city to highlight artistic talent from everyday individuals.

Share the Warmth

Share the Warmth combines textile arts with offering a helping hand to our unhoused, and low-income neighbors. Volunteers knit hats, mittens, gloves, scarves, and other cold weather necessities throughout the year and the Commission for the Arts puts them on display at the library. Items are available for anyone who needs them on the outside of the building. The items displayed are displayed along the 11 Mile Road entrance. As the park is finalized, additional items may be displayed. In the past, about 170 items were taken throughout the winter.

Collaboration Giving Back

Hamer Finch Wilkins Park

706 Walnut Ave, Royal Oak, MI 48073

The vision for the new Hamer Finch Wilkins Park (at Crooks and Walnut) is a peaceful and reflective garden. The design includes pathways, benches, new landscaping, and educational components that tell the story of the city's early Black pioneers, Henry and Elizabeth Hamer, and their descendants. The park sits on .29 acres. It was dedicated on October 29, 1956, and was previously known as Beechwood Park, but was renamed in 2022.

The focal point of the park will be a bronze statue of Elizabeth Hamer created by Detroit sculptor Austen Brantley. Just this past September, six Armstrong Maple trees were planted on the park grounds to represent each of Henry and Elizabeth's six children. Henry and Elizabeth Hamer were slaves in Kentucky who made their way to Royal Oak with help from slavery abolitionists through the Underground Railroad network.
